1 Summary

1.1 The Dog Control Act 1996 (DCA 1996) Section 10A requires territorial authorities to publicly report on dog control policies and practices for each financial year. This report contains the information required under the Act for the year 1 July 2013 to 30 June 2014. A copy of this report must be made publicly available and sent to the Secretary for Local Government.

3 Purpose of the Report

3.1 This report constitutes the annual report that the Council has to prepare on administering it's obligations under the Dog Control Act 1996 (DCA).

4 Dog Control Policy and Enforcement Practices

- 4.1 The Council reviewed its Dog Control Policy and Bylaw in 2014 adopting the Dog Control Policy 2014 and Dog Control Bylaw 2014 on the 18 September 2014.
- 4.2 The objectives of the Dog Control Policy is:
 - To promote responsible dog ownership
 - To minimise any; danger, distress or nuisance created by dogs
 - To have regard to the welfare, exercise and recreational needs of dogs, and
 - To identify required means of dog control in all public places.
- 4.3 Control Services (Nelson) Ltd is contracted to implement the Council's dog control policy and bylaw. Compliance is achieved by:
 - Responding to dog related incidents
 - Targeted property visits and patrols of areas with specific issues
 - Close liaison and cooperation with external agencies
 - Conducting dog safety and bite prevention programs
- 4.4 The Council uses various media to inform the public of dog related issues. The Council's website provides dog related information, online forms and links to relevant legislation and other websites of interest.

 - Dog destroyed with owner consent prior to hearing.
 - Charges; DCA 1996 Section 57(2) dog attack animal and LGA 2002 Section 239
 Contravention of local bylaw.
 - Fined \$600.00 (\$300 each charge).
 - Reparation \$1250, Costs \$340.
- Dog attack pet lamb incident Upper Moutere 30 October 2013.
 - Dog destroyed at time of incident.
 - Charges; DCA 1996 Sections 42(1) failing to register and 57(2) dog attack animal.
 - Fines; Section 42.(1) \$200, Section 57(2) \$500
 - Reparation \$80, Costs \$499.
