### 3. CHAIRPERSON'S REPORT

The Chairperson's report was included in the agenda and had commentary on:

Age Concern running two seminars this year Talking about the Tricky Stuff Living Wills, Enduring Power of Attorney and Facing the Funeral. The second one is Healthy Eating Cooking for One or Two. Richard Till will conduct the seminar. Charissa McKenzie from Public Trust and Francis Day from Marsden House will be at the expo. Comprehensive packs will be available on the day.

# Nelson Housing Issues - Choice, Need and Affordability

Jenny Hawes and Brylee Wayman gave a powerpoint on the Nelson Housing Issues.

## Community Resilience and Good Ageing: Doing Better in Bad Times

Kay Saville-Smith and Bev James gave a talk.

(<u>www.goodhomes.co.nz</u>). How can older people's housing protect people and cater for adverse events, eg floods. For most people in NZ flood rather than earthquake would be the cause of their house being damaged, or communication out.

Older people are more at risk and they recover less quickly. They know their communities and understand them and know where risk areas are.

Research is around how people can prepare their homes better to survive natural adverse events, eg climate change. How people can help each other and prepare to support each other in the events. The goal is to try and assist people to look at their houses in ways they can deal with them now, and help work out solutions to deal with some of the vulnerabilities, but help people to make choices around what's good or bad in the community in terms of houses. It is a two year programme, firstly looking for help from the community. Doing work

across Top of the South, also doing work in urban areas, like Wellington and Hutt Valley and particularly with people in rental accommodation in urban areas.

Nelson/Tasman/Marlborough are dominated by owner occupiers. In Wellington there is a lot of social housing. Work is being done in Kawerau as they had the Edgcumbe earthquake and many of those houses were not properly repaired. 30 years later people are still feeling the effects of the earthquake. Want to look at houses and say if we'd repaired them like this would they be better. Way to get insurance and building about being clearer about how they repair houses and help recovery.

Bev James said this year they are hoping to talk with older people who have experienced adverse natural events, ie storm, coastal inundation, slips, flooding and either living in the same house or in the same community. Looking for people who would be happy to talk to us. She tabled a flyer with contact details for voluntary participation. They want to hold a workshop in Nelson/Tasman with older people and organisations working with older people to talk about experiencing adverse natural events, some of the issues, particularly around how safe do people's houses keep them in an adverse event. Would like advice about when to hold it, thinking before September 2013 and who we should invite. They want good, well established networks. Wanting to get information out and not clash with other things. They are also doing some national surveying which Kay Saville-Smith is leading. Several surveys are happening, because they're national, someone you know might be rung up. We'd like to get information out advising what the survey will be asking. Next year, all information gathering will help develop tools. We want to come back and bring one or more of the tools back to do community testing before the tools are finalised. Happy to talk to individuals or groups about what we're doing.

## Neighbours Day Aotearoa 22/23 March 2013

Neighbours Day is a national campaign which is championed by Lifewise Inspiring Communities, Mental Health Foundation and Neighbourhood Support. Mal Drummond, advised there is a Neighbourhood co-ordinator in Nelson covering 33% of houses in Nelson City. There are advantages to the community. Appointed a co-ordinator for Waimea/Richmond, Marty Price who works out of the Richmond Police Station. He is reestablishing support groups in Richmond/Waimea, with 90 at the moment. It dovetails into Police. They've got Neighbours Day, getting to know your neighbours on 23-24 March 2013. Mayor Parker in Christchurch was asked what was the most effective recovery options subsequent to earthquakes and he had said it was neighbourhood support.

# **Hearing Therapy Services in Golden Bay**

Kim Howell, Life Unlimited Charitable Trust, said she has extra funding for Takaka hearing services and has a two-monthly contract for 2013. She asked that people make use of the service or it won't be extended. They are open to the public. Hearing week is 26 – 31 March 2013 and the theme is "helping people who are deaf and hearing impaired to achieve better quality of life".

## A4A

Sarah Downs, advised that at the last meeting of A4A, the "Good Business check list" was launched. It looked at building codes, barrier-free information and put together a check list for businesses in Nelson, Richmond, Motueka and Takaka to use, either when setting up or retro-fitting their businesses to look at what is good accessibility. A secret shopper went out to find good places that highlighted what we thought showed good access. Nelson Post Shop, Hardy Street, won the award for Nelson businesses, McGlashens Pharmacy won for Richmond, Astrolabe won for Motueka and Golden Bay Museum for Takaka. Leaflets are available at both councils and representatives from business communities have put them on their websites. A4A will have a stall at the Expo. She has been working with the Mayor and Richmond Councillors looking at signage outside shops which can be a real problem. 15 March 2013 is the next meeting of A4A.

## Men's Shed

Mr Mike Rodwell had national conference here. Richmond membership of 120, great place for retired people to meet other guys. Putting in metal work shed. Take on community projects, such as chairs for Saxton Field.

## **Cycleways**

Mr Rodwell is involved in Richmond Information Centre, which is mostly elderly people. They promote the cycle trail. It had been suggested at a Nelson Residents meeting that NCC and TDC could be involved in getting elderly people who can't use the tracks onto quad bikes to take them to see.

Sarah Downs undertook to take the matter to appropriate Council staff.

## **Speed Bylaws**

TDC is currently reviewing all speed bylaws, all roads. Specific suggested amendments, eg Queen Street reduction to 30 kph including Croucher Street Sundial Square area. Submissions close Monday 25 March 2013.
