OPENING, WELCOME 1

Cr Brown took the Chair in Cr King's absence.

2 APOLOGIES AND LEAVE OF ABSENCE

Jane Murray representing Nelson Marlborough Health, spoke on the possible review of the gambling policy stating that the current policy is outdated and that a sinking lid policy would be a better tool to measure and reduce the affects of gambling in the community. She asked that Council consult on its Gambling Policy and revise it to a sinking lid policy.

9 REPORTS

9.1 Annual Compliance and Enforcement Summary Report

The Team Leader – Compliance Monitoring and Enforcement spoke to his report and provided further information that the total number of infringement notices for the period was 25. Responding to questions on Nelson Pine's Resource Consent he clarified that the consent included self-monitoring reports and was subject to renewals every five years. Council carries out peer reviews, but in fact Nelson Pine contracts independent highly qualified specialist monitoring technicians to carry out the regular monitoring process. The consent can be reviewed by the public.

Responding to further questions Mr Cheeseman advised that following the Environment Court's recent decision, Talleys at Port Motueka was undergoing a substantial upgrade to meet its new resource consent. With regard to problems with forestry and slash going into streams and with the new National Environmental Standards for Plantation Forestry, he advised that there is considerable monitoring by the industry to meet its obligations.

Councillors discussed noise and discharge complaints. The Regulatory Services Manager explained that Council was trying to get as much information on compliance into the public

arena as possible in an effort to educate our community. He explained that with the changing urban/rural mix of the population where people are choosing to move out of cities onto lifestyle blocks and with a more aging population who tend to be at home longer, there is a growth in noise complaints including normal everyday farm noises.

9.2 Gambling Venues Policy Review - Supplementary Report

Team Leader - Environmental Health referred Councillors to his previous report as well as the addendum report and responded to questions. The statistics in the report are provided by the Department of Internal Affairs who also licences each machine; the Council only provides permission for the machines to be installed. Compared to other regions, Tasman has a reasonably moderate level of gambling machines.

 - 2.2 Confirmation that relocation of gaming machines will not be permitted within the district; and
 - 2.3 An unrestricted policy in relation to the number of New Zealand Racing Board venues within the district; and
- 3. instructs staff to prepare a Draft Gambling Venues Policy to commence consultation; and
 - 3.1 an associated Statement of Proposal; and
 - 3.2 a Summary of Information based on resolution 2 above,

for further consideration of the Environment and Planning Committee.

9.3 Public Consultation on Priority Earthquake-prone Buildings

It was declared and noted that Cr McNamara and Cr Sangster owned buildings in streets mentioned in this report.

The Technical Lead - Building Assurance spoke to his report which was taken as read. He responded to questions confirming that areas of the district which may be subject to landslides are not part of this legislation, it was to identify buildings only that could affect the lifeline routes in an earthquake event. Staff had already started identifying buildings and despite this project requiring major resources, it was progressing with the help of other organisations in the community.

Following further discussion Mr Beck agreed to forward Councillors a map showing the seismic risk areas which have been updated on Council's ET2 database. It was agreed that the submission period would commence on 27 October until 3 December and that Councillors Ogilvie, Tuffnell, Bryant, Turley and Sangster be appointed to the hearing committee.

- 4) agrees the commencement of the special consultative procedure to the proposed document shall be by public notice in newspapers and Council Web site; and
- 5) agrees that the submission period shall commence on 27 October 2018 and will end at 4.30pm on 3 December 2018: and
- 6) appoints Councillor Ogilvie as the Chairperson, and Councillors Tuffnell, Bryant, Turley and Sangster to the hearing committee to consider any submissions, with authority to appoint replacement members in the event of non-attendance for any reason.

The meeting broke for morning tea at 10.40am and resumed at 10.50am. Cr King returned at 10.55am and assumed the Chair, thanking Cr Brown for stepping in. Cr Kempthorne joined the meeting at 10.55am.

9.4 Extension of Lapsing Periods for Council Designations

The Environmental Policy Planner, the Activity Planning Advisor – Transportation Engineering Services and the Resource Consents Manager addressed the meeting and advised that they had received a letter from one landowner on Wensley Road who was against the use of their land for road widening.

Following discussions Councillors queried why Council should have the financial responsibility

and not the New Zealand Transport Authority for the Motueka bypass designations and that this would be the time to change those designations. The Environment and Planning Manager explained the history behind the designations which in some cases dated back to the last District Scheme in 1992. The Activity Planning Advisor Transportation Engineering advised that these designations relate to existing designations set ten years ago and that we are trying to pick out the ones that Council still has a need for and in the future. they were recorded on titles.

When questioned about Martin Farm Road in Kaiteriteri, Mr Bryant advised that when looking at future designations, this road may be investigated again.

Cr Kempthorne exited the meeting at 11.05am and returned at 11.25am.

5) following approval from the Minister of Conservation, notes the plan change shall be publicly notified as soon as practicable after approval.

9.7 Freshwater Fish Communities of Tasman District 2018 – A State of the Environment Report

Senior Resource Scientist – Environmental introduced the Environmental Monitoring Officer and Mr L Stevens – a consultant to the Estuary Monitoring Programme. Mr Stevens gave an update on progress for this year on the Programme and spoke to the slides he had tabled earlier.

Councillors noted the worrying decline in the fish species Giant Kokopu and the need to preserve healthy waterways to maintain or improve stream habitat, particularly by removing fish passage barriers, riparian vegetation and in-stream cover. They discussed what happens to estuaries when nutrients are added and the effects of muddying and forestry. They also noted the excellent work on fish passage that Mr James had been carrying out across the district and his education programme which had been on national television recently.

The Senior Resource Scientist – Environmental introduced Councillors to a new product called Story Maps which is a GIS based tool that combines maps, text and images at the click of a button. This tool will be linked to Council's website.

Councillors asked if a consistent approach to Maori representation across Council could be considered and that the same language be used - either Maori or iwi, not both. Mr Bush-King explained that Council is all on the same page but that in the Resource Management Act the term referred to is iwi, however the Local Government Act refers to Maori.

Councillors asked for an assurance that Waimea FLAG would be up and running before the Waimea Community Dam commenced, Mr Johnson indicated that the Policy Team was committed to ensuring that this would happen.

Mr Bush-King confirmed that he would arrange for staff to provide a map of Taman's poplar and willow nursey to Councillors.
