Cycle trail links in place for the Christmas holiday

Construction of the 'Coastal' section of Tasman's Great Taste Trail is moving along rapidly with the opening of the bridge over the Waimea River effectively linking the sections of completed trail from Nelson all the way through to Mapua, and inland to Wakefield.

New Zealand Cycle Trail project manager Jonathan Kennett visited Tasman recently to check out local progress – and was impressed. Here is his report:

"Contractors are working overtime to provide holidaymakers with a fantastic Christmas present this summer – a fully connected cycle trail from the centre of Nelson right around Waimea Estuary and across Rabbit Island to Mapua. This 33km section of Tasman's Great Taste Trail is set to be finished on 18 December 2012, just in time for the Christmas break. Last Friday I caught the flat-bottomed ferry from Mapua to Rabbit Island and rode this section to Nelson.

The 11km section weaving through Rabbit Island's pine forest is looking just as good as the day it was opened late last year. From the island a brand new trail heads across farmland to Pearl Creek, a renowned wildlife area, and then to an impressive 100m-long bridge across the

Waimea River. Contractors just finished building the bridge last week and have done a fantastic job.

From the river the trail follows a stopbank before dropping down to Queen Street. A temporary trail then leads beside the road for a few hundred metres before skirting around the Waimea Estuary and into Nelson on an historic rail trail. We had to walk our bikes past a couple of boardwalks that haven't quite been finished (these have since been finished), but otherwise the trail looked very close to completion and was a great ride. Given that Nelson is such a popular holiday destination, this section of Grade 1 trail is bound to get a lot of use this summer by riders of all ages and abilities.

If you have the opportunity this summer, jump on a bike and check it out."

Our District is still the best place to live, work and relax in the country, and I look forward to a busy and productive 2013 making it an even better place.


To those who are spending Christmas alone this year I invite you

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Outstanding natural landscapes and features identified

The programme to identify Golden Bay's Outstanding Natural Landscapes and Features (ONLF) is now in the hands of a small working group.

The group, consisting of representatives of development, farming, marine, lwi and environmental groups, has met four times and is working through various reports and information supplied by the Council and landscape experts.

There have not been any decisions or outcomes reached by the group at this stage as they are focused on fine-tuning

the process. The group is now discussing ONLFs in the Bay by area.

The differing points of view have been aired and discussed in professional and constructive meetings ensuring all of the group's concerns are being worked through. The process will continue with several meetings planned for early next year.

The community-based and driven process is different from the usual Council-led and Environment Court-decided decisions enabling a greater level of local ownership and understanding of the outcome and process.

Blocked road reopens

The Graham Valley road is finally open, after a five-month effort to clear a slip that occurred on 24 June 2012 that blocked one of the main access routes to Kahurangi National Park.

Contractors removed more than 30,000 cubic metres of material from the 60m-long slip, says Selwyn Steedman, Council's Transportation Network Engineer. About 40,000 cubic metres in total came down off the cliff-face, including slips in subsequent heavy rain.

During a tricky restoration, dangerous rock had to be blasted from the top of the slip, which Selwyn described as "massive, height-wise".

The road is now fully restored and already "flat out" since the reopening on Saturday 1 December 2012, he says. A rock crusher will be taken up early next year to process remaining spoil, which will be stockpiled for road repairs and track work by the Department of Conservation. (DoC cannot use river stone because it may contain noxious plant material.)

The NZ Transport Agency has borne most of the \$300,000-plus bill for clearing the slip, with the remainder shared by DoC and the Tasman District Council, which jointly manage the road.

A small party of Motupipi coal-miners began the permanent European settlement of Golden Bay. Sailing ships, and the wharves to accommodate them, soon sprang up.

The development of transport in the Bay, from the unrecorded times of Maori waka and primitive bush tracks, to the dominance of the motor car, is charted in Way To Go, the summer exhibition at Golden Bay Museum in Takaka.

In the century after European miners, millers and farmers arrived, economic growth was accompanied by necessary forms of transport. Coastal traders serviced the Bay from Wellington and Nelson. On inland routes, horse and cart gave way to mailcar, service car and eventually private automobiles.

By the 1930s, shipping was being superseded by trucks with the power to negotiate Takaka Hill.

The exhibition runs until April 2013, complementing the existing displays on Abel Tasman, Maori and European settlement, plus the spectacular geology of the Bay. The museum is open Monday to Friday 10.00 am to 4.00 pm, Saturday 10.30 am to 1.30 pm and Sunday 10.00 am to 4.00 pm.



No cars, no cares

Tasman-Nelson cyclists and visitors are in line for an early Christmas present. From 18 December 2012 they will be able to ride all the way from the ASB Aquatic Centre in Richmond to Mapua with just one short stretch on a public road, the little-used Lower Queen Street beyond the speedway track.

Tasman's Great Taste Trail now encompasses the Deviation path, heads around the estuary to the Resource Recovery Centre, across to Sandeman Road, partly uses boardwalks behind Nelson Pine Industries to reach a path beside Lower Queen Street from the Ravensdown plant to Landsdowne Road, follows Lower Queen Street to the new Waimea River suspension bridge, (to be officially opened and named on 26 January 2013) then proceeds along stopbanks to the Rabbit Island path leading to the Mapua ferry.


Dugald Ley, project engineer for the Tasman District Council, says the Riwaka to Kaiteriteri route should be complete within 3-4 months. "The Nelson Tasman Cycle Trails Trust has made some huge efforts to complete contracts to have the trail available for all to enjoy over the summer season."

The link to Wakefield from Brightwater along the southern extension of Higgins Road will also be completed before Christmas.

Meanwhile, Hope-based builder Mark Brown has donated \$500 to the trail as a way "to thank all the people who supported him", says Dugald. The cheque has been forwarded to the Trust.

Good Access = Good Business

Cluttered aisles cramping your Christmas shopping? Struggling to reach the goods on the top shelves? The Accessibility 4 All (A4A) Forum knows how you feel, Chair Judene Edgar said at the launch of its accessibility checklist.

The regional Forum launched the accessibility checklist to help businesses to meet the needs of customers with accessibility issues, which is pretty much all of us at different times and stages throughout our lives - parents with strollers, sportspeople with injuries, the vertically challenged, or just those of us who don't want to knock half the stock off the shelves when trying to walk down an aisle.

The checklist, Good Access = Good Business is a self-assessment guide covering 10 key areas that businesses may wish to consider to

improve their accessibility and consequently attract more customers.

"We wanted to provide a tool that supported businesses to consider accessibility, rather than dictated to them; Good Access = Good Business", said Judene.

As part of the launch, held at Tasman District Council on Friday 7 December 2012, four businesses from throughout the region that have already demonstrated good awareness of accessibility were acknowledged; NZ Post Shop, Astrolabe in Motueka, McGlashen's Pharmacy in Richmond and Golden Bay Museum.

The A4A Forum is supported by Tasman District Council and the printing of the checklist was funded by Nelson City Council.

Revised Development Contribution Policy out for consultation

In June this year when the Council released its Long Term Plan, Councillors and staff received considerable feedback on the changes to the Development Contribution policy, particularly from the development sector.

In response, a series of meetings were held with representatives of the development community, which allowed them and Council staff to discuss the issues. At the same time Councillors decided that the discounts available to first home builders in the previous policy would be retained.

During the consultation process developers raised an additional concern. They felt the ability for the Council to charge "top up" payments on Development Contributions depending on when the development occurred was unfair, even though it is permissible in law. The revised policy, which is open for consultation until 14 January 2013, has addressed this concern with the inclusion of a "Once Paid, Always Paid" principle.

Development contributions are an acknowledgement of the increased cost

to the Council and ratepayers to ensure infrastructure is in place to cater for new developments. The costs are identified by modeling the growth the District will experience over the next ten years. The policy is designed to ensure the costs are equitably shared amongst those who benefit from the development and that they do not fall unfairly onto Tasman ratepayers.

Tasman is one of the fastest growing districts in the country and development will be ongoing. It has been acknowledged throughout this process that the need to work together is essential if this growth is going to benefit the District as a whole.

Working in partnership - acknowledging the roles of both the development sector and the Council - is necessary to deliver sustainable, well planned growth. We believe this process and the resulting policy have been a good step in that direction.

Revised Development Contributions Policy – Summary of Information

Introduction

Development Contributions are charges to pay for the capital expenditure needed to cope with the demands of population growth. The Development Contributions Policy (DCP) covers residential, commercial, retail or industrial developments.

The Tasman District Council is proposing a change to its DCP. The proposal is to adopt a "Once Paid Always Paid (OPAP)" system which recognises any previous payment of a Development Contribution as being the full and final for that specific DC requirement.

Submissions are now invited on this proposed change to the policy.

Council is required under the Local Government Act 2002 to seek public feedback through a Special Consultative Procedure on this Statement of Proposal as part of the process to consider this revised Policy.

Background

The Council adopted its Long Term Plan (LTP) on 27 June 2012. The LTP lays out Council's intentions for the District over the next 10 years and includes key information on projects and finance. The LTP provides for \$404.8 million of capital expenditure over the next ten years. Of this \$45.0 million is required to meet the increase in population from 48,100 in 2011 to 53,200 by 2031.

Included in the plan is a Development Contributions Policy (DCP); this policy shows how Council will recover money to pay for this growth.



Revised Development Contribution Policy – Summary of Information (cont.)

The DCP in the LTP included the following changes from the previous policy:

- 1. A 67% discount on water, wastewater and stormwater development contributions which was available to individuals developing land by constructing a first dwelling on a title was removed.
- 2. Council introduced the ability to charge interest on outstanding debt from Development Contributions.
- 3. A 5% discount available to those paying their full DC at the time of collecting the associated Building Consent was removed.

The intention of these changes was to make the policy more equitable. Councillors and staff received considerable feedback from the development community on the changes to the DCP following adoption of the policy at the end of June. It was apparent that developers felt the changes had not been adequately notified to them and as they lacked the information they had been unable to submit effectively on the LTP.

In response to this concern Council at a meeting on 19 July 2012 resolved to retain the discounts for those building a first dwelling on a title that were in place in the previous DCP until a review of the new DCP had been completed. This review was conducted with input from staff and stakeholders in the development community. During this consultation process developers raised an additional concern, in that they felt the ability for council to charge "top up" payments on DCs was unfair even though it is permissible in law.

Detail of Proposal

Council has subsequently agreed that the Development Contribution Policy be reviewed on the basis of adopting a "Once Paid Always Paid" Policy (OPAP)

An OPAP policy would mean that a first residential dwelling on a title where a DC has been paid previously for a specific purpose i.e. roading, stormwater, water or wastewater, would not be required to pay an additional DC for that purpose at time of building. This would only apply to residential dwellings; commercial buildings would continue to be subject to the current methodology i.e. the Household Unit of Demand (HUD) system (refer to the full policy).

The introduction of the OPAP policy would remove a system that is considered unfair by most developers and the administration of DCs would be more straightforward for both developers and council staff. A disadvantage is that less income would be received and if there is DC under-recovery for any reason this would have to be made up from other sources or projects delayed or cancelled. An estimate shown in the report indicated that this could be in the region of \$1,450,000 per year, however this is impossible to quantify with complete accuracy as a significant amount of future forecasting is required when estimating income.

As Council indicated that the DCs should be collected as provided for in the LTP no other changes are proposed to the existing policy i.e. the discount is not proposed to be reinstated. A copy of the full policy is available on the Council's website, at Council offices or on request.

Copy of the full Proposal

This summary outlines the main points to the proposal to amend the Development Contributions Policy. The full proposal, including the options that Council considered, is available for inspection at the Council's Servcie Centres in Richmond, Motueka, Takaka and Murchison, as well as at the Council libraries in Richmond, Motueka and Takaka. 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Control of Liquor Bylaw in place

Police will be given wider powers to control alcohol in public places in Tasman District. The Council's new Control of Liquor in Public Places Bylaw will apply 24 hours a day in some locations.

The new bylaw will come into effect on 14 December 2012, and has resulted from requests for greater controls from Police, says Environmental Health Co-ordinator Graham Caradus. Changes from the existing bylaw include an extension of the hours that apply in the Richmond, Motueka and Takaka CBDs to 24 hours a day, and a 7.00 pm to 7.00 am overnight ban has been included in most urban areas as well as other smaller communities in the District.

The intent of the Bylaw is to meet Police needs by providing a useful tool to combat alcohol-related harm. The vast majority of people will remain unaffected by the controls in the bylaw, said Mr Caradus.

People will still be able to purchase and deliver unopened bottles

of alcohol through liquor ban areas, and the bylaw has no effect on the operation of licensed premises such as pubs and cafés. It is also generally understood that the police focus is on alcohol-related harm, and people enjoying a quiet drink for example, with a picnic in a park within an alcohol ban area, are unlikely to attract Police attention unless there is antisocial behaviour also occurring.

The bylaw does provide for exemptions to be issued by the Council free of charge, should people have more formal occasions that they wish to have certainty over, such as street parties, or perhaps a wedding party wishing to consume some bubbles during a photo session in locations like Council's parks or reserves, or popular beaches such as Kaiteriteri.

The new bylaw can be viewed on Tasman District Council's website, or at Council Service Centres.

Tasman Street Ambassadors

The Tasman Street Ambassador (TSA) service is underway for the summer season, with experienced youth workers having a presence in the Richmond and Motueka CBD between 8.30 pm and 2.30 am on Friday and Saturday evenings.

The service works in partnership with the local Police, night patrol, and Maori wardens to ensure that young people in Tasman enjoy their nights out on the town in a responsible and safe way. While predominately based in Richmond and Motueka, the mobile service will go wherever it is needed – including regional events.

The TSA service has the backing of Tasman District Council and Council's Community Recreation Officer Paul McConachie is very supportive of the role the TSA plays in our community.

"The TSA is never going to be able to be everywhere all the time, but by working in partnership with the other agencies, they are able to react proactively to situations, and help prevent unnecessary harm and disorder from escalating".

The service runs through until the first weekend in February 2013.

TSA is provided by the not for profit youth organisation HYPE-GS, which has been involved in the Safer Streets initiative since its inception in 2010.

Christmas and New Year closures

Tasman District Council's Office and Service Centres in Richmond, Motueka, Takaka and Murchison will close over the Christmas and New Year period, but the emergencies hotline is always available.

Richmond, Takaka and Motueka close at 3.00 pm on Monday 24 December 2012 and reopen at 8.00 am on Thursday 3 January 2013.

Murchison will be closed from Monday 24 December 2012 and will reopen Thursday 27 December 2012. Murchison closes again on Monday 31 December 2012 and reopens on Thursday 3 January 2013.

Council's 24-hour emergency service operates at all times over the Christmas/New Year break. Just phone your local Council office.

Libraries in Richmond, Motueka, Murchison and Takaka will be closed on Christmas and Boxing Days, 25–26 December 2012, plus Tuesday 1 January 2013 and Wednesday 2 January 2013.
