What is an Annual Plan?

The Annual Plan sets out what we will do, how much we plan to spend and what income we expect to receive during the 2016/2017 financial year. This annual review allows ratepayers to see how we are performing against the targets we set, in consultation with the community, in our comprehensive Long Term Plan. The Long Term Plan covers a 10-year period (the current plan is for 2015–2025) and is reviewed every three years. The Annual Plan 2016/2017 is Year 2 of the Long Term Plan 2015–2025.

It's the time of year where Council shares the Annual Plan for our District with you. This sets out what we are going to be delivering to you in the coming year including priorities for our District.

We are proud of our successes – reducing spending and keeping rates increases down, while still making progress on some major projects and maintaining or enhancing the levels of service we provide to the community.

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Tasman's Great Taste Trail has reopened, but please be aware flood damage repairs are ongoing at the Lower Queen Street, Richmond, end of the track.

Because flooding washed away some sections of the trail as it approached the Waimea Cycleway Bridge, a diverted track has been created so you can travel around the impassable sections. You may need to hop off your bike and walk for a short distance as you negotiate this area.

Council staff and contractors have been working to repair the trail after heavy rain at the end of February damaged the track and saw tree branches swept down the river become lodged against the cycleway bridge. The trail was closed from Lower Queen Street to Moturoa/Rabbit Island for nearly a week while the branches were removed, the bridge repaired and a track diversion created.

We expect the repairs to be completed by the end of March.

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Wetland upgrade to protect Aorere River

An upgrade of the wetlands at the Collingwood Wastewater Treatment Plant is set to begin in March, and will ensure continued protection of the Aorere River from wastewater contamination.

The wetlands, which are part of the treatment system at the Collingwood plant, are undergoing some improvements to repair small seeps and eroded embankments, raise low points and improve flow through the wetland to reduce the risk of overflow. The Council is also planting over 400 additional native wetland plants in the wetland cells.

The wetlands are made up of five cells and the sides separating the cells have collapsed over time. We will be rebuilding the cell sides with rock, and rebuilding external wetland embankments to prevent any seepage. Then we will replace clogged and broken pipes between the

wetland cells. This will allow flows to pass through to the UV treatment system without overflowing.

The treated and disinfected wastewater from the plant is discharged to a stream feeding into the Aorere River. We need to make sure wastewater is treated to a high standard in order to protect our rivers and streams. Keeping our treatment systems operating well is key to being able to do that.

The work, to be carried out by Downer, should be completed by May. The treatment plant will continue to operate throughout the upgrade, so residents should not experience any disruption. The Collingwood plant treats wastewater from the township, and serves approximately 300 people.

Public meeting to discuss the Government's Freshwater Reform

The Government is seeking feedback on proposed changes to the way fresh water is managed. These reforms aim to improve the management of fresh water to deliver better environmental and economic outcomes and better outcomes for iwi.

As part of the feedback seeking process the Ministry for the Environment is holding a number of meetings throughout the country over the next few weeks.

The Nelson Tasman regional meeting has been scheduled for Wednesday 23 March, 6.00 pm–8.00 pm at Seifried Estate 168 Redwood Road Appleby.

ON TRACK TO ACHIEVE TASMAN'S LONG-TERM GOALS

We've responded to calls to reduce rate and debt increases, and to provide consistent levels of service. We started doing this through the Long Term Plan for 2015-2025. Now with the Annual Plan 2016/2017, we're continuing to see some of the benefits.

A lot of work went into developing the last Long Term Plan, in response to community concerns about Council debt and projected increases to rates. The Long Term Plan for 2015-2025 delivered a more positive forecast for the District's finances than previous plans. Debt was capped at a maximum of \$200 million, while rates income rises were limited to a maximum of 3% per annum.

The ink is still drying on that document, so we don't plan to deviate from it – the strategies and targets we agreed with you remain in place. Favourable financial conditions and strong population growth mean that you'll see more positive results than planned through the Long Term Plan 2015-2025. This gives us confidence that we are on a solid foundation, and we intend to stick to the existing programme of work, and levels of service.





- Total rates for most properties will rise by less than \$1/week.
- Council's rates income rise will be 1%.
- Stormwater and wastewater rates will rise for many urban residents.



- Net Council debt is predicted to reach \$166m, down from the \$178m forecast.
- Low interest rates, a strong starting position from 2014/2015 and a lack of adverse weather events have meant debt can be paid off faster.



- The quality and range of services we provide will not decrease.
- Water supply and stormwater services will be improved for some residents.

WHAT'S COMING UP TASMAN DISTRICT COUNCIL ANNUAL PLAN 2016/2017



MAJOR PROJECTS FOR 2016/2017

Our major capital works programme remains largely unchanged. Major projects include:

Richmond Central improvements and Queen Street Reinstatement projects: Due to start in late 2016, these projects involve upgrading many of the underground services along Queen Street between Salisbury and Gladstone Roads, and improving how stormwater is managed on the street (cost: \$13.7m). We know that pulling up parts of the roads and footpaths will disrupt some visitors and businesses, so for this reason we are looking to reduce the number of times this will need to happen by combining much of the work at once. Reinstatement options for the pedestrian areas and roads are also being looked at. Over the summer, we have been talking to residents about ideas to widen the pedestrian areas, increase street plantings and narrow the road. You'll hear more about this project during 2016.

Recreation Facilities: Construction of the Golden Bay Community Recreation Facility is expected to be completed in November 2016 (Council contribution: \$3.2m). This multi-use recreation and community facility has come about after a huge community effort and will serve many of the clubs and organisations in Golden Bay. We also expect the Saxton Field Velodrome will be completed in December 2016 (cost: \$1.6m); and extension of Tasman's Great Taste Trail to reach Kohatu (cost: \$1.8m).

Stormwater: Several stormwater projects will be occurring around Richmond to address recent flooding. Work will continue on Borck Creek, Richmond so that the risks of flooding are reduced and the Richmond West area can be developed for residential purposes (cost: \$3.1m).

Wastewater: The Motueka Wastewater Treatment Plant upgrade will continue and is expected to be completed by the end of 2016 (total cost: \$8m). The replacement of the Kaiteriteri wastewater pipeline project will get underway in 2016, replacing a wastewater main running through the Bay with a land based main, (cost: \$3.9m).

Water: Construction of a new reliable water supply for Wakefield will get underway so that the township can have water that meets the NZ Drinking Water Standards, as well as providing for growth (cost: \$4.1m).



SOLID WASTE

In April 2012 Nelson City Council and Tasman District Council approved a Joint Waste Management and Minimisation Plan. That Plan included a goal to jointly make the most effective and efficient use of the councils' respective landfills, York Valley and Eves Valley. Substantial investigation

and independent advice has consistently shown that joint use of Nelson's York Valley landfill, then subsequent use of Eves Valley landfill benefits ratepayers of both councils and is the most cost-effective approach for each council. We consulted on this joint approach in 2014. Since then, further work on the project has resulted in a proposal for the two landfills to be operated under a joint venture model with each council having a 50% share. As Nelson's landfill has a higher value this will require a \$4.2m payment from Tasman District Council to compensate. The proposed joint entity will be modelled on the Nelson Regional Sewerage Business Unit which has successfully looked after both councils' interests in the Regional Sewerage Scheme for the past 15 years. Nelson City Council is consulting on the proposal through its Annual Plan. We will be talking to our community through this Annual Plan process, and will investigate the need to amend our Long Term Plan. Depending on the outcome of consultations the joint venture will commence on 1 July 2017.

WAIMEA COMMUNITY DAM PROJECT

The Council is committed to finding a secure water solution for the Waimea basin. We are continuing to work with potential funding partners and the Waimea Community Dam Ltd to secure the funds needed for the project.

We are seeking greater certainty about the cost of the Dam through a tender process in order to have a fully informed discussion with Tasman residents on whether or not to proceed. You can expect to hear more from us about options for funding and ownership over the coming year.

We're going to be out and about around the District between now and mid-April talking about the Annual Plan and what it means. Tasman Resource Management Plan Proposed Plan Change 60 Rural Land Use And Subdivision Policy Review

The Council has prepared amendments to the Tasman Resource Management Plan, known as Proposed Plan Change 60: Rural Land Use and Subdivision Policy Review.

This Plan Change reviews and updates the policy and rules for rural land use and subdivision. The proposed amendments ensure greater protection of productive capacity, allow for flexibility of use and maintain rural character – while offering greater choices for landowners.

Submissions

Any person may make a submission on any part of any of the proposed Change. Submissions can be sent to the Environment and Planning Policy Manager, Tasman District Council, Private Bag 4, Richmond 7050 to be accepted by the Council until **4.00 pm on Monday 14 March 2016**. Submission forms are available as indicated below under "Availability of Proposed Changes".

Submissions must be in writing, clearly indicating support or opposition to the provisions, the decision that the submitter wishes the Council to make (with reasons), whether or not the submitter wishes to be heard in support of the submission and an address for service or contact address.

Consideration of Proposed Amendments

After submissions have closed, the Council will publish a summary of all decisions requested by submitters. There will be a further period of 10 working days within which further submissions in support of or opposition to those submissions made may be sent to the Council. The Council will then hold hearings on all submissions and all submitters may be heard. After the Council considers the submissions and makes its decisions, any submitter who is not satisfied with the decision has the right of appeal to the Environment Court.

Thanks for your feedback

Consultation on several key projects closed at the end of February – thanks to everyone who took the opportunity to have a say and help us plan for the future.

Moturoa/Rabbit Island

Public feedback on the future of Moturoa/Rabbit Island held a clear message – "we love it, just the way it is". We received 560 surveys and 82 comments by the 29 February deadline. Policy Adviser Anna Gerraty also met with a wide range of groups and users of Rabbit/Rough and Bird islands over summer.

"The overwhelming theme that came through was that people love the naturalness, open spaces, variety of recreational opportunities and lack of commercial activity on the islands," Anna said.

We will now consider the feedback and prepare a draft management plan for the islands, which will be available for public comment by the end of April 2016.

Central Richmond Projects

We received 140 written comments on the future design of Queen Street, 17 on a proposal for medium-density housing in central Richmond and 18 on a review of the rules for the Richmond central business zone. Our staff also chatted with more than 100 people about the three projects during open days at the Richmond Mall and Richmond Library. We'll keep you updated on progress with all three projects in coming months.

Future of Wakefield and Brightwater

The first round of submissions on the future of Brightwater and Wakefield are in, with 34 of you taking the opportunity to have a say on the detailed plan changes. The next stage will be for us to make a summary of the submissions available for public viewing and an opportunity for further submissions. Keep an eye on our website for updates.





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
