Kaiteriteri sewer main replacement

The project to replace Kaiteriteri sewer main is on track.

The design has been finalised which has a number of major changes to the current system in place. First it is a new, larger sewer main and secondly, and probably most importantly, it is in the road between Stephen's Bay and Goodall Road replacing the current pipelines which cross the Tapu Bay estuary. The larger pipeline is needed to account for burgeoning growth in Kaiteriteri and a road-route is preferable for environmental and cultural reasons and ease of maintenance.

The pipeline will generally be in the landward side of the road, except for a few sections where it will move across the road to avoid service clashes. The new design requires new Resource Consents and a Heritage New Zealand archaeological authority. Assuming all permissions are granted we will advertise the construction tender before Christmas and aim to start work in March 2017. The work program is planned so that it avoids the busy summer period.

Independent audit confirms safety of new Queen St design

An independent audit into the safety aspects of the new design for Richmond's Queen Street has confirmed the narrower road carriageway will reduce traffic speeds and contribute to a safer environment.

The Queen Street project, set to begin in earnest in February 2017, will increase the flood capacity of stormwater pipes and direct water away from buildings in future heavy rainstorms. Ageing water and wastewater pipes will be replaced at the same time. The surface of the street will be reshaped to create a more pedestrian friendly space for our community.

Project Manager Jeannie Homesley explains: "The design is intended to discourage heavy traffic from using Queen Street, instead promoting the

use of the ring road. While the carriageway will be narrower than it is now, it will be the same width as Upper Queen Street above Salisbury Road.

"The idea behind the design is really about creating a pedestrianfocussed main street. Low traffic speeds, a wider footpath and more attractive pedestrian spaces will contribute to that."

We have now advertised the tender for the work, and Jeannie said she was expecting national interest. "The scale and complexity of the work means we are looking for someone with experience of CBD construction."

Tenders close at the end of September.

Help stop the pest plant invasion

Pest plants affect lots of different areas in our environment – water, wetlands, ground cover and grass, shrubs and trees, and vines.


Pest plants invade native areas in our region and can spread quickly – meaning it's even harder for our native plants to survive. Some pest plants are in our Nelson Tasman Pest Management Strategy, but there are also very invasive plants that there are currently no legal requirements to control. For those we rely on your support and assistance – and we have a range of information and expertise to help. Pamphlets are available on our website, with photos to help aid pest identification as well as practical advice on different control methods.

The pamphlets also include a list of appropriate herbicides and their mix rates. A glossary at the rear includes more detail on chemical usage – including chemical names, brand names, safety warnings, explanations and helpful websites.

Prepared and equipped for marine oil spills

As a regional council one of our jobs is to be prepared for effective responses to oil spills in our environment. Our hope is that we will never need to put this training into action – but should an incident occur, we're ready to take action.

To help us be prepared, six staff from Tasman District Council together with staff from Nelson City Council and the private sector, were recently trained in how to respond to oil spill emergencies. The training covered legislation and how to deal with different types of spills, as well as hands on practice with the machinery used in an event. Completing the training means that we now have 13 staff available to respond to oil spill emergencies, including three trained specifically to deal with oil-affected wildlife. Revalidation training takes place every year.

New Lease for Motueka Top 10 Holiday Park

We have agreed to a new lease for the Motueka Top 10 Holiday Park in Fearon's Bush Recreation Reserve.

The new lease continues provisions for the protection of trees and to ensure public access for picnicking (apart from a two-month peak camping period where public access is restricted).

Design concepts and changes to the holiday park's entrance and parking are being considered to address concerns raised by members of the community about traffic and parking. The new lease was the subject of a public hearing in November 2015. It has a 33-year term, expiring in 2048. This is effectively an extension of eight years to the holiday park's existing lease, due to expire in 2040.



Various accidents and near misses have been reported from this activity including collisions between Ski Tubes, collisions between tow boats and Ski Tubes and collisions between tow boats and persons in the water.

- No vessel may tow more than one Ski Tube, except with permission of the Harbourmaster.
- 2. No vessel may carry more than 3 persons on a Ski Tube, except with permission of the harbourmaster.

Anchor your land with free trees!

We are coming to the end of the August planting window and still have a number of poplar and willow poles in 1m to 1.5m lengths available for planting. What's more they are free to landowners affected by or worried about erosion on their property.



The varieties on offer are suitable for a range of purposes including erosion control and fodder. We can match plants to your location and climatic conditions.

Available in 1.5m lengths are Kawa, Argyle and Veronese poplar, and Tangoio and Aokautere tree willow. In 1m lengths are Gigantea (osier/shrub willow).

Planting is simple:

Keep pole ends wet until planting. Work (or dig) a 60cm hole into the ground with a planting bar (or spade), and compact soil around the pole. For best results plant by the end of August, and keep cattle away until poles have a stem diameter of over 200mm and can withstand rubbing. Please contact our Land Resource Scientist Bernard Simmonds to discuss your requirements. A planting guide will be provided with poles. Email bernard.simmonds@tasman.govt.nz or Ph. 03 543 8446.
