# In case you missed it...

Catch up on what we've been up to with our round-up of recent Council meetings and the decisions made.

### **FULL COUNCIL 1 DECEMBER 2016**

- Declined a request to reinstate the stairs on the Takaka grandstand, noting the request was dependent on Heritage NZ declining an application to remove the grandstand (Heritage NZ have given consent for the removal).
- Agreed to establish a joint committee to manage Saxton Field, subject to Nelson City Council's agreement.
- Decided not to release a policy allowing Easter Sunday trading in the District. Easter Sunday will remain a non-trading day in Tasman.
- Agreed to dissolve the Mayoral Relief Fund charitable trust because it had fulfilled its purpose. Donations are better fed through existing community relief funds.

## COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE 8 DECEMBER 2016

- Appointed Motueka and Golden Bay Community Board members as liaison representatives on a range of community organisations, such as hall and reserve management committees and facility working parties.
- Approved \$40,000 for earthquake strengthening of the Riwaka Hall and \$80,000 for earthquake strengthening of the Hope Hall.
- Agreed the Council should investigate participating in the Ballance Environment Awards (recognising high-quality environmental and sustainable farming practices) in partnership with the West Coast, Nelson and Marlborough councils.
- Agreed to investigate ways of encouraging youth representation and contribution to the Council's decision-making processes.
- Granted \$15,000 from the Special Grants Fund to the Project De-Vine Trust for a project to control pest vines from Ligar Bay to Wainui Inlet.

# Exhibition features history of Ngāti Rārua and Te Ātiawa

The fascinating stories of Ngāti Rārua and Te Ātiawa and their relationship with Motueka will feature in a new exhibition at Motueka District Museum, opening 4 December.

Mai i Hawaiki – Te Ahi Kā Roa tells the story of the great migrations these tribes made, travelling with related and allied tribes down the west coast of Te Ika a Māui (The Fish of Māui – the North Island) and to Te Tau Ihu o Te Waka a Māui (The Prow of Māui's Waka – the top of the South). Rich in stunning imagery and with unique and beautiful taonga (treasures), Mai i Hawaiki – Te Ahi Kā Roa speaks of significant people, places, and stories that have shaped the lives of Ngāti Rārua and Te Ātiawa Māori who live in Motueka. From early trade with whalers and traders, through the loss of land and livelihood due to the New Zealand

Company and Crown acquisitions, to the revitalisation of today, Mai i Hawaiki – Te Ahi Kā Roa tells the story of courage, resilience, and fortitude of those who kept the home fires burning.

Developed in association with Nelson Provincial Museum as part of their outreach and support of affiliated museums, Mai i Hawaiki – Te Ahi Kā Roa will be the Motueka District Museum's featured exhibition over the summer

# Group seeks feedback on Takaka's freshwater management

The Takaka Freshwater and Land Advisory group (Takaka FLAG) has been working on proposals to manage and protect Takaka's precious freshwater resources – and now the group wants your feedback.

The FLAG was set up to provide recommendations to the Council on how to manage freshwater allocation and water quality in the Takaka catchments.

It has come up with proposed approaches outlined in a summary report which is now available on our website.

The proposals will make more water available for use in some areas, but will also require changes in how water use is managed during dry periods to protect stream ecology. Water quality management focuses on addressing known problems and protecting Takaka's already good (and often exceptional) water quality now and for the future.

The proposals seek good management practice by all rural and urban

water users, including management of on-site wastewater and stock access to water bodies. Promotion and support of stream restoration is also a key focus.

Over the next few months, the FLAG and Council staff will discuss the proposed water management approaches with iwi, water users and the local community before FLAG makes their recommendations to the Council in 2017.

# **Great tip for using leftovers**

We received many wonderful and creative suggestions for using leftovers through the Love Your Leftovers competition run by Love Food Hate Waste.

The winner of a River Cottage – Love Your Leftovers Cookbook was Sharon Sloane, with this great recipe for Grape and Apple Chutney using fruit that is past its best.

### **Grape and Apple Chutney**

### **Ingredients:**

- 1kg combined grapes and cored, peeled apples
- 500g chopped onions
- 500g sultanas
- 1 cup brown sugar
- 3 cups white vinegar
- 1/2 tsp dry mustard
- ½ tsp ground ginger
- ½ tsp salt
- · Pinch cayenne pepper

### **Method:**

Cook everything together in a large saucepan. Bring to the boil gently, cover and cook for one hour or until mixture is tender and thickened. Add a little more vinegar if necessary. Pour into hot clean jars and seal. Delicious with cold meats.

Recipes and tips were judged by Guy McCracken and Kate Neame of Oxford Street Kitchen and Roastery. Guy says: "I chose this recipe because it's a great use of food that might otherwise head for the bin, and as an added bonus preserves and chutneys can be used over the longer term".

# Waimea River Park development

Regular users of the Waimea River near the Appleby bridge will see a significant step forward with implementation of the planned Waimea River Park. The park will stretch from the Waimea cycle bridge back up towards Brightwater incorporating Challies Island and the Two Rivers walkway.

From late summer 2017 the area on the eastern (Richmond) side of the river bank from Lower Queen St to the gravel crushing plant by Appleby Bridge will be closed to vehicle access. Direct vehicular access to the riverbed itself from the upstream existing track running parallel to the river will be also be closed off along this eastern bank from the Clover Road West entrance.


This will enable the development of the area immediately upstream of the bridge in a manner similar to the park on the other side of the highway which incorporates flat areas with barbecues and easy access to the swimming hole.

By limiting vehicle access to the area we will be able to develop the riverbank with minor earthworks and planting sympathetic to the area.

The development of the Waimea River Park is a long term project that will be ongoing over the next decade. Work to date has focused on establishment of native plantings upstream of Appleby Bridge, mostly around the Twin Rivers walkway. While vehicle access is limited to specific car parks walking and cycling access will remain throughout the development.

## New rural land rules come into effect

We have finalised the new rules governing rural land use and subdivision, which better protect the District's best productive land while also offering greater flexibility for landowners.

Thank you to everyone who contributed to the review of the rules – whether through a submission, attending a public meeting or speaking at the hearing. Several changes were made as a result of this feedback.

The new rules came into effect on 10 December 2016. Submitters have a right of appeal if they disagree with the final decisions.

### Key changes

Some of the main changes to the previous set of rules include: Rural 1 and 2 zones:

 Landowners have a final opportunity to subdivide as a 'Controlled Activity' which requires a low level of consent. After that, further subdivision of the same area of land is discouraged – becoming a 'Non-complying Activity'

- Introduction of an average minimum lot size to increase flexibility for landowners
- Boundary adjustments and amalgamations which improve productive opportunity are encouraged.

Rural 1, 2 and Rural Residential zones:

- Provision for a detached minor dwelling of limited size as an alternative to an attached housekeeping unit of any size
- Better policy support and guidance for co-operative living

  All rural zones:
- Increased protection for rural character and amenity through encouragement of low-impact design and adjusted boundary setback
- Guidance about what new commercial and industrial activities can establish

# Ambassador to lead 2016 Abel Tasman commemorations

Dutch Ambassador Rob Zaagman is making a special visit to Golden Bay/Mohua for this year's Abel Tasman commemorations on 18 December. Earlier this year the ambassador and his wife Monique were formally welcomed with a powhiri at Onetahua Marae.

"It's really exciting to have the ambassador here as part of the annual commemoration," says coordinator Penny Griffith.

The meeting on 18/19 December 1642 between Tasman's sailors and tangata whenua is hugely significant in New Zealand's history. It was the first meeting of two peoples, and provides the first descriptions in word and image of Maori and their language and musical instruments. Tasman's voyage also put New Zealand on world maps for the first time

Mayor Richard Kempthorne will join the ambassador at a working dinner on Saturday night. They will be joined by a small group of locals involved in planning next year's 375th anniversary of Tasman's voyage. On Sunday 18 December the ambassador will visit the Abel Tasman Monument and Golden Bay Museum. Both events are intended to increase public awareness of what happened 374 years ago in Golden Bay/Mohua, and the museum displays.

"These are the only permanent displays in New Zealand to this earliest recorded event, and people come from around the world to visit

them," says Penny, who is also chair of the museum board. "We're very proud of that, and conscious of our national heritage responsibilities." # **Spooners Tunnel reopens**

Spooners Tunnel is once more open again to cyclists and walkers.

Work to strengthen the northern entrance of the tunnel was completed early in December.

The 125-year-old tunnel was temporarily closed to ensure public safety after a routine inspection in August identified a small crack at the entrance. Rain caused some delays, but we are pleased to have been able to reopen this important section of Tasman's Great Taste Trail before Christmas.



# Summer swimming water monitoring underway

Each summer we increase our water quality monitoring at popular swimming and recreational water locations around the Tasman District.

Results are posted on our website and updated regularly throughout the summer: www.tasman.govt.nz/link/swimming-water

The risk of catching an infectious disease from swimming in clear, clean water is usually low. However, after rainfall, contamination occurs through runoff into waterways.

To minimise the risk of exposure to harmful bacteria it is best not to swim in discoloured water, for at least the first 24 hours – and preferably 36 hours – after heavy rainfall.

### **Toxic Algae**

We also keep a close eye on rivers for toxic algae during the summer months and post results to our website. See www.tasman.govt.nz/link/toxic-algae. During extended summer low flows, the warmer weather conditions for algae to become toxic become more likely. Mats of algae can produce toxins which are dangerous for children and pets. Keep an eye on children and dogs near the water – and don't let them eat any algae. You can report large mats of algae by phoning us on 03 543 8400.

# Summer rubbish and recycling collection

Because Christmas Day and New Year's day fall on Sunday this year, there will be no change to normal kerbside collections.

All Resource Recovery Centres will be closed on Christmas Day and New Year's Day but otherwise will be open normal summer hours.

### Kaiteriteri kerbside collections

In Kaiteriteri, there will be additional collections from 20 December -13 February. Rubbish bags will be collected daily from 7.00 am and recycling will be collected every week.

Please place your recycling bins and bags on the roadside in a location where our drivers can see them clearly. If you leave the area prior to collection day or you have extra recycling, you can drop your official rubbish bags and recycling at any Resource Recovery Centre free of charge.



# Freedom camping for self-contained vehicles only

Tasman District is a destination that attracts a lot of holiday visitors. We want to be good hosts but are aware freedom camping generates concern in some parts of the district.

Freedom camping on Council-owned land is only allowed for vehicles certified as self-contained. This means they have an installed selfcontained toilet and at least three days' storage capacity for drinking water, toilet waste and grey water.

Campers in non-self-contained vehicles and tents must stay in registered campgrounds. In reality, we know that this does not always happen. We have boosted the budget for enforcement this year and will be installing some extra signage and information for travellers to reinforce the message.

However, it can be difficult for our enforcement team to find the hard evidence they need to take action against non-compliant campers. You can help by providing us with as much detail as you can about offenders. Let us know the time, place, a registration number – and if at all possible take a photo.

To report a problem with illegal camping, you can ring any of our Council service centres (see our website for your local office number, www.tasman.govt.nz). Out of hours calls will be automatically redirected to our 24-hour line.

Behavioural issues, such as excessive drinking or rowdiness, should be reported to the police. We are waiting for the outcome of the Government's review of freedom camping and the enforcement powers available to Councils before we can finalise a review of our Freedom Camping Bylaw. We expect that to happen in early 2017.

# Wainui Bay spat farm rezoning approved

We have approved a rezoning application by the Wainui Spat Catching Group that recognises the national importance of the area and provides for the continuation of spat farms into the future.

The group's current consent for spat catching in Wainui Bay expires in 2024. The rezoning of eight spat catching sites means spat catching and spat holding will become controlled activities in the area, subject to controls on their management. Mussel farming will be prohibited.

A hearing on the proposed rezoning was held in Takaka in August. After considering all the information, the hearing committee agreed to approve the rezoning with some changes to the original proposal in order to reduce the impact of spat catching operations on residents in Wainui Bay.

# Pest Plant Accord helps prevent pest weed spread

We are a member of the National Pest Plant Accord – a register of unwanted organisms in New Zealand.

Biosecurity Officers undertake surveillance and enforcement to prevent the spread of the plants. Two of the plants in the accord are Moth plant (Anredera cordifolia) and Queensland poplar (Homalanthus populifolius) and are found throughout our region. If you have these on your property, they will need to be controlled. Head to www.weedbusters.org.nz to find out how.
