# STOP! Demonstrations show less speed means less harm

School children will receive a vivid demonstration of why the road is not a playground – and grown-ups will be reminded to slow down – during stopping distance demonstrations throughout the District in April.

Everyone is welcome to join their local school in watching the demonstrations, which show how long it takes for a car to stop when travelling at different speeds.

Tasman District Council Road Safety Coordinator Krista Hobday says the events are an effective way to show children how important it is not to cross the road in front of an approaching car – even if it looks a reasonable distance away. "The demonstrations show that our 'people' (which are cardboard cut-outs) have no chance if a car is travelling at 60km an hour when the driver sees them and begins to brake. That's important for the children to realise the danger an approaching car can pose.

"For grown-ups, it's also a sobering way to show the damage they could do to a child if they are travelling too fast and need to stop quickly. At 60kmh there's just no way they can stop in time to avoid injuring or killing someone. At 40kmh, however, the car is able to stop in time – and that's why we encourage motorists to slow down, particularly around schools."

# Environment and Planning Committee 16 March 2016

- Received an update on the River and Stream Management Fund, which offers financial assistance to farmers wishing to fence stock away from streams and wetlands on their land. New criteria will prioritise work with the greatest environmental benefits, and enable catchment-focused fencing projects.
- Learned the results of an in-depth study into soil types on the Waimea Plains will allow for far more precise planning and land management on the Plains. The survey shows far greater soil variability on the Plains than previously realised. The survey will be available on our website and on Landcare Research's S-map programme, and will be explained in more detail in a future issue of Newsline.

- Heard the resource consents team processed 447 non-notified consents, and 39 notified consents, between July – December 2016.
- Removed the deferred zone status of land at 118, 126 and 134 Champion Road, Richmond, allowing its residential zoning to come into effect. A portion of land at 144 Champion Road also had deferred zoning lifted for rural-residential (serviced) zoning to come into effect.
- Received a summary of results of a customer survey of the Council's building and resource consent services. The survey showed improved satisfaction levels from the previous survey, including overall satisfaction of 85.5%, compared with 75.5% earlier.
- Learned that although Tasman's rivers achieve a 96% swimmability rating under the Government's new Clean Water Package, we will need to improve water quality further under the package.


The best option is often to use the ring road and off-street parking.

# Takaka FLAG

Friday 10 March was a busy day for the Takaka FLAG as they took their interim proposals to the community for comment and discussion.

Two meetings attracted approximately 500 people to different venues – the latter, Takaka Primary School Hall, chosen to cater for the large number expressing a desire to attend.

Despite the FLAG's focus being on the entire Takaka catchment, much of the discussion centred on Te Waikoropupu Springs and was driven by the fear held by many the Springs may be at risk. The FLAG was at pains to clarify that all FLAG members are very aware of the sacred and special nature of Te Waikoropupu Springs and its great significance to iwi and the community. In fact, many of its draft recommendations give the Springs greater protection than they have now – not less as some suggested.



There is still work to do before the FLAG's recommendations to the Council are finalised. The FLAG is waiting for the final science report to be delivered and further discussions with iwi needs to occur - all of which will be considered, as well as the feedback received from their interim report and the recent public meetings. Once the recommendations are received by the Council, they will be incorporated into a draft plan which will then be subject to another round of statutory consultation.

#### Temporary route change – Tasman's Great Taste Trail

Tasman's Great Taste Trail has been re-routed for a short section in Richmond while work is undertaken to protect both the Richmond Resource Recovery Centre and the cycle trail from erosion. From Beach Road, the trail will travel along Fittal Street for 260 metres before joining back up with the permanent trail. A temporary 30kmh speed limit has been introduced on Fittal Street to ensure the safety of cyclists on the diverted route. The temporary route will be in place until early April.

# Classic boat event reservation and speed limit uplift

The Rotoiti Power Boat Club will be conducting a regatta involving high-speed power boat racing at Kerr Bay, Lake Rotoiti between 8.00 am and 6.00 pm on both 1 and 2 April 2017.
