

Community brainstorms improvements for Ellis Street

Brightwater residents have taken an active interest in plans to make improvements to the main street through the village – letting us know their main priorities for Ellis Street during a feedback round in September.

Brightwater School students got involved, brainstorming ideas before creating model streetscapes using Lego. Residents came along to a public meeting to share ideas, and a working group of representatives from local business, the school, residents' association, police, heavy haulage companies and others also had input.

Thank you to everyone who contributed for your time and interest.

Brightwater is a rapidly-growing community and with that comes some pressures on the main route through the village. We want to make sure Ellis Street – which is home to Brightwater School, the village shopping precinct, and forms part of Tasman's Great Taste Trail – is safe for all users, as well as being an attractive public space.

To achieve that, we are looking at options for streetscaping and other improvements.

Next steps

Between now and Christmas, Council staff and consultants will work on a draft design, which we hope to share with the community in early 2018. There will be another opportunity for feedback before the design is finalised. Work is expected to start in July 2018.

In case you missed it...

Stay up to date with what we've been doing with this round-up of recent Council meetings and the decisions made.

Community Development Committee – 21 September 2017

- Adopted a revised Policy on Housing for Older Adults 2017, which guides the management of 101 Council cottages, including tenant eligibility, rents and funding. The policy and cottage application forms are available on our website, www.tasman.govt.nz.
- Agreed to carry out a feasibility study on an extension to the Motueka Library.
- Heard work to complete the Motueka Museum earthquake strengthening was due for completion in late September.
- Heard an application was made to the Tourism Infrastructure
 Fund for a contribution towards projects at eight popular tourism
 locations. The projects include new toilets, rubbish compactors,
 showers and a caravan/motorhome dump.

Full Council – 28 September 2017

- Adopted the Annual Report 2016 2017, recording a \$12.9 million underlying operating surplus and reduced net debt of \$122m.
 The full report will be on our website later this month once minor amendments have been made.
- Approved the Regional Pest Management Strategy for public consultation. The strategy will be open for submissions from late October.
- Agreed to an equal funding split with Nelson City Council for future work at Saxton Field. Tasman's population is now larger than Nelson's, and users of the facilities at Saxton Field come from throughout the region.
- Activated residential zoning for land between Iwa Street and Aranui Road in Mapua, and industrial zoning for land in the Richmond West Development Area. These areas now have infrastructure in place to support housing development, so their "deferred zone" status can be lifted.



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Another round of land rezoning for Wakefield

We are proposing a second round of zoning changes for Wakefield in response to community feedback.

The proposals are:

- · Re-zone some land on Bird Lane from rural to residential (deferred until infrastructure is in place)
- Re-zone some land at Totara View Road from rural residential to rural
- Re-zone some land at Higgins Road from rural to rural residential (deferred)
- Specify the location for an indicative walkway between Genia Drive and Kilkenny Place.

These ideas were suggested in submissions on an earlier round of rezoning and rule changes

for Wakefield, which were designed to manage likely population growth over the next 20 years. After carrying out more research and talking to those likely to be affected, we are ready to formally propose extra changes to the Tasman Resource Management Plan and invite your submissions.

Biosecurity in the garden

The home garden is one of the greatest sources of weed infestation in New Zealand.

It is from our gardens that all kinds of introduced weed species have become established and spread out into the wider environment. People who live near areas of native vegetation and conservation areas need to be particularly vigilant.

Spring is the perfect time of year to get planting, but it's important to take care with plant purchases made online, at markets or galas, or gifted by a friend. Make sure you're familiar with the plant variety you're buying to ensure it's not a biosecurity nasty.

If you're not sure, call into your local Service Centre and ask for a free copy of the National Pest Plant Accord.

Plants at retail outlets should be tagged so you know what you are buying. We inspect these outlets annually.

There are ongoing biosecurity threats at New Zealand's borders and the public's help is essential if any new threats make it into the country. If identified early enough and tackled promptly, new incursions can be eradicated – the Great White Butterfly here in Nelson-Tasman is a great example.

Report a problem

If you notice any strange plants, insects, or disease symptoms on plants on your property, call the Ministry for Primary Industries on 0800 809 966.

Make Motueka disposable cup free

An innovative new campaign aims to cut the number of disposable coffee cups thrown away and reduce the waste ending up in our landfill.

We're supporting the initiative to Make Motueka Disposable Cup Free and CupCycling™, led by local business IdealCup, because it ties in perfectly with our focus on waste minimisation.

Even compostable cups often end up in landfill – they need to be processed in commercial composting facilities, which adds cost and complexity.

How it works

Pay a \$10 bond at any participating café and receive your hot drink in a reusable CupCycling™ cup. Return the used cup at any participating CupCycling[™] café for a fresh one when you need your next caffeine fix.

Every hot drink purchased will receive a discount.

Initially, Celcius Coffee, Mot Bike Co, Kai Waka Café and Muses Café in Motueka will participate, and IdealCup plans to roll the CupCycling™ programme out to the rest of Motueka over the next few months.

Celcius Coffee estimates its participation alone will prevent 10,400 disposable

cups going to landfill each year. With four cafés on board, that number grows to an estimated 41,600 fewer cups making their way to landfill every year. We hope you will join us in the push to Make Motueka disposable cup free!

New-look street takes shape

Another section of the new-look Queen Street has opened, giving a feel for how the street will look, feel and function once the full upgrade is complete.

Most of Stage 2 (from Noel Leeming to the Cambridge Street closure) is now open, so head on down and take a look – it's looking great.

The new design

While the huge amount of work that has gone on underground to replace ageing and undersized water and stormwater pipes can't be seen, you may notice the new road profile. The centre of the street

has been lowered, which creates a channel for stormwater to better protect the businesses on Queen Street from flooding.

As well as serving a stormwater function, the street surface has been designed to create a far more pedestrian-friendly, accessible and pleasant public space.

There is no kerb and channel, which makes navigating the street easier for a wide range of pedestrians – including those with limited sight, in wheelchairs, with canes or walkers or pushing prams.

Wider footpaths prioritise pedestrians, and combine with the new 30kmh speed limit to calm traffic speeds.

New plantings and seating add to the attractiveness of the street as a place to meet, mingle and spend time.

Pool inspections set to start

An inspection of swimming pools will begin soon, making sure all pools in our District are safely fenced and meet regulations.

This is required by the Building Act, which was amended at the start of this year to include pool barrier audits.

That means if you have a swimming pool on your property, an officer will be visiting. There is a fee of \$150 per inspection.

In between audits, you can do your own regular checks to ensure your pool is safe and secure and complies with regulations. Check that:

- the pool area is contained within a physical barrier that restricts access to children under 5 years old.
- the pool gates open away from the pool, self-close and have a childproof latch.
- There's nothing climbable outside the pool barrier.

 Only pool-related activities are in the pool area. It's not a good place to plant the vegetable garden or store the kids' toys.

Remember that 'take home and pop up' pools with a water depth of over 400mm must also meet the requirements of the legislation.

Do your trees hang low?

Now is a good time to check that the vegetation on your property hasn't become a nuisance. If you have a hedge, shrubs or trees that grow alongside a footpath it's up to you to make sure they don't make it hard for people to get past – including those with prams or mobility scooters. So please take a walk around your property and check if any trees, shrubs or bushes need a haircut.

Moturoa/Rabbit Island front beach logging

For the next month there'll be logging activity at Moturoa/Rabbit Island's front beach. There are also some closures on Rough Island. Visitors to the island are asked to keep to the marked trails and obey signage. Logging is in progress and trucks are in constant use, so please act with caution, particularly at intersections. Cancel by 2.00 pm the day before the booking – no charge

From 1 August 2017 you can cancel an inspection booking if you are not ready, until 2.00 pm the day before, without incurring any fees. Cancellation after 2.00 pm will incur a cancellation fee of \$150. Any inspection we encounter not ready at the time of inspection will result in a failed inspection and will incur the standard \$150 re-inspection fee.
