Golden Bay Community Board member Lynne Ensor has resigned from her role, which has left a vacancy on the board. We are calling for nominations between now and Friday 22 December 2017.

If you are passionate about your community, a good listener and communicator, can digest and analyse a wide variety of written material and think you can make decisions that are in the best interests of your community – consider putting your hand up. Golden Bay Community Board chair Abbie Langford says, "The role is challenging and busy, but also rewarding. I really enjoy being part of a group who supports their community. The role involves listening to, understanding and supporting the Golden Bay Community.

A by-election for the vacant Community Board seat will be held on Saturday 17 February 2018.

Pick up a nomination form from our Takaka or Richmond offices, or online at www.tasman.govt.nz. A deposit of \$200 (including GST) is required, which can be paid by eftpos, cash or cheque.

Candidates should submit a candidate profile statement and a recent photograph, which will be sent out with voting documents if an election is required (that is, if there is more than one candidate).

In addition to the events in Golden Bay, I will also be hosting Mayor Ard van der Tuuk and a

delegation of six other visitors including staff, Aldermen and Councillors from Grootegast in the Netherlands. Grootegast is the birth place of Abel Tasman and Tasman District has a Friendly Communities relationship with the municipality. It will be my pleasure to host Mayor Ard and the six other visitors during their stay here between 13–20 December.

In case you missed it...

Full Council – 16 November 2017

- Authorised the chief executive to sign an agreement allowing the formation of a project governance board for the Waimea Community Dam, and equal cost-sharing between the Council and Waimea Irrigators Limited until a joint venture company is established.
- Agreed to remove the Golden Bay grandstand with care so heritage elements can be stored and used in a future rebuild should a community group wish to do so.
- Appointed Cr Dean McNamara as the Council's representative on the Nelson Regional Sewerage Business Unit and Cr Mark Greening as a director to the Nelson Airport Ltd board.
- Adopted the Mapua Waterfront Area Masterplan 2018 2038. More information on page 11.
- Resolved not to establish a Māori ward for the 2019 local council elections. More feedback will be sought from iwi to consider

whether a poll on the establishment of a Māori ward should be considered prior to the 2022 election.

• Adopted the Risk Management Policy, which guides work on the management practices and processes needed to identify, assess and control risk across the organisation.

Engineering Services – 23 November 2017

- Approved the next round of school safety signage improvements, which will see improved signage at Henley School, Garin College, Waimea Intermediate, Waimea College, St Paul's Catholic School, Salisbury School, and First Years Richmond.
- Approved the transition of the Queen Street Upgrade construction contract to a lump sum price contract and noted an increase in the forecast project cost to \$14.5 million – an increase of about 7% – largely due to unforeseen work needed to deal with contaminated soil and to replace a stormwater pipe that was found to be badly damaged.

Tasman's Street Ambassadors are back

The Tasman Street Ambassadors are back for summer, helping keep our streets safe for everyone after dark.

Skilled youth workers will be out on the street in the Motueka and Richmond areas from early December to early February, between 8.30pm – 2.30am on Fridays and Saturdays.

The Street Ambassadors team will patrol public places, delivering safety messages, offering advice and assistance when needed and

intervening with the aim of stopping trouble before it starts. They work in partnership with local police, community patrols and Maori wardens to keep our communities safe.

They also engage with the public and provide information on Council bylaws and regulations, facilities and services, as well as events taking place across the district.

The Street Ambassadors service is provided by Tasman District Council and delivered by Youth and Community Works.

QUEEN STREET - A PLACE FOR PEOPLE

The construction teams are packing up and Queen Street is set to reopen for summer. The new streetscape is in place from the McIndoe intersection up to Sundial Square. It not only looks fantastic, but is a safer and easier space to navigate for pedestrians, particularly those with limited sight or mobility.

HERE'S HOW IT WORKS:

Wider footpaths – our beautiful wide footpaths are for pedestrians to use and enjoy, and are obstacle-free for those in wheelchairs, with canes, pushing prams and so on. Please no cycling or manoeuvring cars on the footpaths.

The buffer strip – this is the safety zone between the road and footpaths, between cars and people. Please no cars on the buffer strip.

Outdoor seating - to rest, meet or mingle.

Slower traffic speeds – the 30kmh speed limit and narrower road carriageway promote slow vehicle speeds and mean a safer

environment for everyone. This is where cyclists travel – the speed limit is slow and vehicles may need to slow further for cyclists travelling ahead of them in the lane.

Enhanced plantings – the ornamental pear and titoki trees and shrubs provide shade and a pleasant view.

A smooth, continuous surface – there's no kerb and channel in the new streetscape. That makes crossing the street much easier for those with limited sight and mobility. Queen Street is a shared space, so drivers and pedestrians both need to take care when travelling through the area.

Car parks – parking is available between the buffer strip and the road – mind the planter boxes!





It's property revaluation time

The Tasman District's three-yearly revaluation of property values is underway. Our contracted provider Quotable Value (QV) will send property owners notification of their new valuations from 8 December 2017.

The effective date for this revaluation is 1 September 2017, and any objections to your property's revaluation must be made to QV by 9 February 2018.

Any changes in the market since 1 September 2017 won't be included in the new rating valuations. This means a sale price achieved in the market today may be different to the new rating valuation. Rating valuations are not designed to be used as market valuations for raising finance with banks or as insurance valuations.

How do revaluations impact rates?

The 2017 revaluations will be used as a basis for distributing individual rates obligations for the next three financial years, starting from 1 July 2018.

There is no direct relationship between your property valuation and an increase or decrease in rates. The revaluation does not increase or decrease our total rating income but it does affect how rates are allocated across the District's ratepayers. If you think of the Council's rates income as a pie, the size of the pie does not increase because of the revaluation. However, your slice of pie might get bigger if your property value has increased by more than the average.

An increase or decrease to your rates bill could result if:

- Your property value increases by more or less than the average increase or decrease for the rating area
- Your property value decreases by more or less than the average decrease for the rating area
- Your property value alters as a result of new improvements being added e.g. consented building work.

Rates set on a uniform charge basis (e.g. Uniform Annual General Charge, District Facilities Rate, etc.) are unaffected by a district-wide revaluation.

Workshops to reduce harm from earthworks, sediment

Fine sediment has been described as a "master contaminant" – it always causes adverse effects, and when combined with other contaminants such as nutrients and heavy metals, it causes far greater damage.

While some sediment is generated from natural slips and stream bank erosion, much

of the impact comes from human land disturbance and development.

In February we're running a series of workshops for everyone in the development industry. Along with practical tools and professional knowledge, the workshops will showcase new methods to reduce harmful environmental impacts and reduce compliance costs.

The workshop presenter is Graeme Ridley, who has a wealth of experience in this

field. Council staff will also present the latest relevant State of the Environment information and new national rules that are about to come into effect.

RUBBISH AND RECYCLING

Kerbside Collections

Our collection contractor Smart Environmental is gearing up for their busiest time of year. Here are a few things you can do to help them give you the best service this summer.

BINS AND BAGS OUT BY 7.00 AM

Rubbish and recycling must be on the kerbside by 7am on collection day, even if your collection is normally later in the day. This allows for changes to the truck's collection route, which happen from time to time.

In summer, Smart Environmental starts some collections earlier and puts on additional trucks. Traffic and weather conditions may also mean they need to change their schedule.

Please also make sure your rubbish and recycling is on the kerbside, in clear view of the driver.

RECYCLABLE ITEMS ONLY

From time to time Smart Environmental conducts audits of recycling bins put out for collection. If your bin is contaminated with nonrecyclable items (for example, soft plastics, tetra-pak containers, polystyrene, or general rubbish) then it will not be emptied.

If this happens to you and you are unsure why, please check the list of recyclable versus non-recyclable items on our website – www.tasman.govt.nz/link/recycling.

If you are still unsure, please contact your local Council office for advice.

RIGHT WEIGHT IN THE CRATE

The blue glass crates are for clean clear, green or brown glass bottles and jars. The crate's contents cannot sit above the top lip of the crate and the crate should not weigh more than 12kg. Glass that sits above the top lip of the crate may seem harmless, but it poses a risk to the driver and also passing members of the public if it were to fall off while the crate is being lifted.



Broken glass in the crate will also result in the crate being rejected.

You can buy a second crate from Council offices or Resource Recovery Centres, or drop off extra glass free of charge at our Resource Recovery Centres.

DROP IT OFF FREE OF CHARGE

If you think you may have missed your collection time or have had your bin rejected, you can take recyclable items to your local Resource Recovery Centre. They will also accept Tasman District Council rubbish bags free of charge.

There are five centres located throughout the region at Richmond, Motueka, Murchison, Takaka and Collingwood. For opening hours, head to www.tasman.govt.nz/link/recycling.

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Draft Regional Pest Management Plan Open for Consultation

Introduced pest animals and pest plants pose major challenges for our region. These pests affect our productive sector and natural ecosystems, destroying the habitat of native birds, animals and insects. The focus of the draft plan is on high-risk pests that are in the early stages of infestation as these make best use of the councils' limited resources. In most situations, the occupier is responsible for managing pests on their property. One of the changes in this draft plan is that Council staff will formally take responsibility for controlling two categories of pests (Exclusion Pests and Eradication Pests) as this is the most efficient way to deal with them. Swimmability Success at Tukurua Stream

Tukurua Stream is a small hill-fed, stream in Golden Bay. Swimming is a popular activity at the beach near the mouth of the stream.

Faecal indicator bacteria concentrations at the marine beach (140 metres from the mouth) are consistently low, yet high concentrations were detected in the stream at the swimming hole near the mouth. As a result of sustained monitoring and investigation since 2010, and cooperation from landowners, the swimming hole is finally meeting swimmable standards.

The sources of faecal contamination ended up being quite a few and have been revealed piece by piece over several years. Discharges from failing septic tanks, stock drinking troughs and stock loafing areas were found to be the major contributors.

We're very pleased to have made progress with this stream, and are very thankful to all the local people and landowners who have contributed to making this popular summer spot safe and swimmable once more.





Final preparations for First Encounter 375 Events

Finishing touches are being put on preparations to commemorate the 375th anniversary of Abel Tasman's first encounter in Aotearoa.

Planning group convener Penny Griffith says the group is working hard as final details fall into place.

"We've got a really strong team working closely with Manawhenua ki Mohua, DOC, schools, the Village Theatre, and volunteers and community groups such as waka ama," she says.

Penny says the significance of the event is reflected in the visitors coming to mark the occasion.

"Descendants of Ngati Tumatakokiri (the iwi who encountered Tasman in 1642) are participating, along with Netherlands Ambassador Rob Zaagman, and seven official visitors from Grootegast, Tasman's home region.

"This may be the first time in 375 years that Ngati Tumatakokiri and the Dutch have been together in the original location of that first encounter."

Historians and Dutch visitors from around New Zealand are also coming.

Programme

After a powhiri for the official party at Onetahua Marae, the formal opening takes place on Saturday 16 December 2017 from 4.00 pm – 6.00 pm.

The Pohara Hall, near Tarakohe Harbour and the Abel Tasman Memorial, will be the hub of the events. A specially developed "Welcome Aboard" exhibition and other displays will be open to the public throughout, from the afternoon of 16 December. In addition, documentaries, boat trips, talks, a waterbased event in Tarakohe Harbour, and a community variety show are all planned.

Dam consultation attracts hundreds of submissions

Last Sunday (26/11) was the closing date for submissions on our funding and governance proposals for the Waimea Community dam. At the time this issue of Newsline went to print, we had received more than 600 submissions. Staff have been busy collating the wide variety of submissions received.

Thank you to everyone who took the time to think about the proposals, and let us know your views.

This consultation cycle has opened up a number of conversations throughout the District and the wider region about the need for the dam, process, who is funding what and how, and the responsibilities of all parties involved. It is important these conversations continue as there are a number of steps that still need to be taken before a final decision on whether to proceed with the dam is made.

Next steps

Hearings will be held in mid-December, which provides the opportunity for submitters to talk directly to the Hearing Panel. Submitters who indicated they would like to personally speak to their submission will be notified, if they haven't already, as to where, when, and at what time. From there, the submissions will be considered by the Hearing Panel and recommendations made to be adopted by Full Council in late February.

Lower Queen Street utilities upgrades driven by growth

If you have driven down Lower Queen Street lately you will have seen the rapid residential development beginning down there. This area will soon be the site of major water, stormwater and wastewater upgrades to cater for the growth.

Starting in early December, an extension of the Headingly Lane sewer main will begin, followed by upgrades to the water and sewer mains in Lower Queen Street. The construction will finish with an upgrade to the stormwater system in Lower Queen Street. All these projects are required to meet growth in Richmond West and that requires significant upgrades to the utilities networks. The works will require traffic management in the westbound lane of Lower Queen Street. All work has been designed to minimise water shutdowns and other disruptions.

As the work advances on each of the projects, our contractors will be in touch with any property owners or residents who are directly affected.

A masterplan for Mapua's waterfront

A masterplan to guide the future development and management of Mapua's waterfront area will see open spaces retained and improved, the Mapua Wharf area preserved as a vibrant visitor destination, and improvements to parking, lighting and pedestrian safety.

The Mapua Waterfront Area Masterplan 2018–2028 was adopted following extensive public consultation, including community workshops, a survey, engagement with iwi, submissions and public hearings. We received 366 submissions on the draft masterplan, 723 survey responses and held 31 individual and group 'face-to-face' meetings, as well as three public forums engaging a broad range of community groups, clubs and organisations.

The key elements of the masterplan include:

- Preserve the area between Golden Bear Brewery and the estuary as public open space, with minor improvements such as restoration of grass, extra seating and shade and delineated cycle, path and beach access
- Retain Council ownership of the Mapua Wharf area, and preserve its vibrancy as a visitor destination

- Retain the Waterfront Park as open park space and explore improvements to enhance community facilities such as picnic tables, barbecues, shelter, and a low-key playground
- Retain Council ownership of remediated land on Tahi Street and Aranui Road as a strategic asset for the future
- · Improve, preserve and maintain Grossi Point Reserve
- Improve and manage parking
- Improve lighting and accessibility and safety of walking areas.

A proposal by the Mapua Boat Club for a boat ramp in Waterfront Park was not included in the plan, for a combination of reasons – including conflict with a high-pressure wastewater pumping main, marine health and safety issues from disturbing remediated land, the estimated cost, parking and traffic issues, and that nearly half the submissions were in strong opposition.

We do recognise the need for a solution to the boat ramp issue and plan to include funding for a feasibility study in the draft Long Term Plan to be consulted on early next year.

Tasman Mayor Richard Kempthorne thanked the Mapua community for its input into the plan. "The unprecedented growth and popularity of Mapua has driven the need for a coordinated, strategic plan for the waterfront area. I think the masterplan gives us a great blueprint for future improvements in Mapua."
