Waimea Community Dam will proceed

The Council has confirmed the Waimea Community Dam will be built to provide the water our growing community needs, safeguard the regional economy, and improve the health of the Waimea River.

On Friday 30 November the Council made its final decision on the project, voting 9–5 to confirm its commitment to build the dam.

The key drivers for that decision include:

The Council cannot meet its obligation to provide an urban water supply now and in the future without water storage on the scale the dam provides. Demand control measures will not reduce demand from homes and business to the extent required if there is no dam

The alternatives to the dam either cost more, don't provide the same water security against droughts, don't provide for future increases in demand or don't meet the Council's legal obligations under the National Policy Statement on Freshwater Management and the National Policy

Statement on Urban Development Capacity. Some fail on all counts.

The dam is the only option that solves all the water-supply challenges facing the Council and community in one piece of infrastructure – urban water supply needs, horticultural water supply needs and declining river health with associated environmental, cultural and recreational impacts.

For that reason it is the only option that attracts a significant amount of co-funding from other sources – from irrigators, the Government and Nelson City Council.

About the Waimea Community Dam

- A concrete-faced rock wall dam in the upper Lee Valley
- Holds 13.4 million cubic metres of water

- Stores water from the upper reaches of the river. Water can be released in a controlled way when during times of low river flows to enhance river health and recharge groundwater aquifers.
 No additional pipework or treatment infrastructure is needed.
- \$105.8 million total project cost.
- Funded by Tasman District Council, Waimea Irrigators Limited, Crown Irrigation Investments Limited, Nelson City Council, Freshwater Improvement Fund grant.

Mayor's message

The Council voted to give the Waimea Community Dam the 'green light' at the Council meeting on Friday 30 November.

The key benefits of the dam will be improved river health, a secure long term urban water supply and ongoing regional economic prosperity. It has been a long process to reach this stage. This has been a highly contentious project with people feeling strongly for and against the dam. Now that we have made this decision let's as a community embrace it and recognise the benefits that this creates for us for generations to come. It is clear that these major water infrastructure projects are very challenging for any community to effectively deal with in New Zealand.

With the Dam proceeding, water conservation will still be important for our region. Regardless of whether there is an ample or restricted supply we need to ensure that we use water efficiently and that we do not adversely affect the environment. Looking after our water resources and use, is something that all of us in the community need to engage in constructively and work on together.

We have a wonderful environment and we want to keep it that way.

As we are now in summer, it is good to know that water quality is regularly monitored at popular swimming and recreational locations around the region. If you are wanting to check whether a beach or river spot is safe to swim in, you are welcome to have a look at the Council website www.tasman.govt.nz/link/swimming-water. You can also have a look on the LAWA website www.lawa.org.nz at a link called "Can I swim here?" This will give you links to our region as well as the rest of New Zealand.

Water will be gold for our future, let's look after it.

In case you missed it...

A summary of recent Council meetings and the decisions made.

Environment and Planning Committee - 29 November 2018

- Welcomed Ngati Tama to the meeting with a mihi whakatau and received Ngati Tama's Environmental Management Plan.
 The Council must have regard to iwi management plans when reviewing its Resource Management Act plans or making decisions on resource consents.
- Agreed to consult the public on a new policy for dealing with dangerous, insanitary and affected buildings. Consultation opens on 10 December – more on page 6.
- Received information on housing and business market activity in Nelson-Tasman between April and June 2018. House sale prices continue to grow but not as steeply. Poor housing affordability continues to be a theme for both Nelson and Tasman.
- Received an update on the Council's plan for implementing national freshwater quality guidelines and approved it for public release in December 2018.

- Agreed to a review of the Tasman Resource Policy Statement and Tasman Resource Management Plan. The plans must be reviewed every 10 years, and some of the current policy and rules don't reflect national policies, standards and case law. This is a major project that will take several years and require significant public input.
- Agreed to consult on charging fees for monitoring compliance with new national forestry rules. Consultation opens on 10 December – more information on page 7.
- Received information on the health of the Moutere River and its tributaries. Staff will now develop a strategy and plan as a first step towards improving the ecological health of the catchment.
- A report on swimming water quality monitoring between November 2017 and April 2018 showed 94% compliance with national swimming water quality guidelines.

Summer monitoring of swimming water quality underway

Every summer we monitor our water quality at popular swimming spots around Tasman District.

We're fortunate in this District to have very good water quality overall - 98% of our popular swimming spots meet the Government's "swimmable" standard. Results are posted on our website and updated regularly throughout the summer, so you can check the water quality at your favourite swimming hole or beach before you head out: www.tasman.govt.nz/link/swimming-water.

The risk of catching an infectious disease from swimming in clear, clean water is usually low. However, after rainfall, contamination occurs through runoff into waterways.

To minimise the risk of exposure to harmful bacteria it is best not to swim in discoloured water, for at least the first 24 hours - and preferably 36 hours - after heavy rainfall.

Toxic algae: We also keep a close eye on rivers for toxic algae during the summer months and post results to our website.

Extended periods of warm weather and low, slow river flows create conditions where algae is more likely to become toxic. Mats of algae can produce toxins which are dangerous for children and pets. Keep an eye on children and dogs near the water – and don't let them eat any algae. You can report large mats of algae by emailing

Upgrades coming to a town centre near you

We have budgeted just over \$3 million for town centre upgrades in Brightwater, Collingwood, Takaka, Mapua and Motueka between 2020 and 2028.

First up is Brightwater, where a new concept design for Ellis Street aims to create safe and accessible pedestrian, cycling and vehicle linkages, improve the streetscape and recognise local stories. Network Tasman have recently confirmed they will contribute to undergrounding the overhead power lines along Ellis Street.

We carried out community consultation in Brightwater in 2017, which included discussions with a working group made of representatives from local business, Brightwater School, the residents' association, police, heavy haulage companies and others.

We also did an interactive brainstorming session with Brightwater School pupils, and a public drop-in session for the wider community to contribute ideas. Construction of the upgrade is scheduled for late 2019.

One of the elements of the upgrade is construction of a roundabout on the intersection of Ellis Street and Lord Rutherford Road. Currently turning trucks have to cross the centre line to get around the corner, which is not safe. The intersection will be widened and a small roundabout installed to prevent this happening. Detailed design for the street

upgrade are nearly finished, so we expect to be able to share more details soon.

Next is Motueka town centre, scheduled for 2022/2023, followed by Mapua town centre in 2024/2025, with Takaka's town centre scheduled for 2026/2027 and Collingwood finishing it off in 2027/2028.

The aim for all the town centre upgrades is to create safe and accessible pedestrian, cycling and vehicle linkages and improve the streetscape.

Tasman's Street Ambassadors are back

The Tasman Street Ambassadors are back for the summer, helping to keep our streets safe for everyone after dark and connecting you with what's going on in the region.

Skilled youth workers will be out on the street in the Motueka and Richmond areas from early December to early February, between 8.30pm - 2.30 am on Fridays and Saturdays.

The Street Ambassadors team will patrol public places, delivering safety messages, offering advice and assistance when

needed and intervening with the aim of stopping trouble before it starts. They work in partnership with local police, community patrols and Māori wardens to keep our communities safe.

They also engage with the public and provide information on Council bylaws and regulations, facilities and services, as well as events taking place across the district.

The Street Ambassadors service is provided by Tasman District Council and delivered by Youth and Community Works.

If you need a second crate for glass, you can buy one from any council office or RRC for \$20.

Temporary speed limit change -Martin Farm Road, Kaiteriteri

A trial temporary speed limit change will apply on Martin Farm Road, Kaiteriteri, over the busy summer period. The speed limit will be reduced for the full length of Martin Farm Road from 50 kmh to 30 kmh, from Monday 3 December 2018 to Friday 2 March 2019. The 30kmh speed is in line with other existing speed restrictions within Kaiteriteri township, and follows feedback from residents with safety concerns due to the increased number of pedestrians, cyclists and cars over summer.

First Encounter 375 documentary screening

375 years after Abel Tasman and his crew came face to face with Ngati Tumatakokiri in Golden Bay/Mohua, descendants of Ngati Tumatakokiri and people from Abel Tasman's birthplace meet again. The film records the 2017 4 day event of the coming together of people from different lands: local iwi Manawhenua ki Mohua, who welcomed Ngati Tumatakokiri descendants back to what was once their tribal land and official visitors from Grootegast in the Netherlands.

Bateup Road widening: Christmas work shutdown

Work on the widening of Bateup Road, Richmond, will take a break over the Christmas period to reduce disruption to residents and the public over the holiday season.

The project is to widen the road and provide a shared walkway/cycleway path to cater for increasing volumes of vehicle, cycle and pedestrian traffic from new subdivisions and a new supermarket planned for the area. It includes upgrades to water and stormwater infrastructure for the growing population in this part of Richmond.

Construction will stop between Friday 21 December and Monday 7 January. We hope to reopen the road to two lanes over that time, but will assess whether we can ensure pedestrian and motorist safety before making a final decision.

Proposed charges for plantation forestry monitoring

Consultation open 10 December 2018 - 1 February 2019

The new National Environmental Standard for Plantation Forestry has significantly changed the way we monitor forestry activities in Tasman District. Under the new standard, the Council is now responsible for monitoring permitted activities such as earthworks, crossings, quarrying and harvesting. The extra monitoring comes at a cost, so we are proposing to introduce charges on the individual or company being monitored so these extra costs don't fall solely on general ratepayers.

The proposed charges are:
