### In case you missed it...

A summary of recent Council meetings and the decisions made.

#### Community Development Committee – 8 August 2019

- Received the results of the annual Communitrak residents' survey. More information on page 3.
- Approved an increase in casual adult admission prices for the Richmond Aquatic Centre, from \$7.20 to \$8 for an adult swimmer and from \$6.20 to \$7 for an adult and preschooler or person with special needs and caregiver. Casual entry prices will stay at \$3 for preschoolers and \$5.10 for children, students, Community Services Card holders and seniors. The admission price was last increased in October 2010 and the centre's costs have risen over the past nine years.

#### Engineering Services Committee – 15 August 2019

- Adopted the joint Nelson Tasman Waste Management and Minimisation Plan, which includes an aspirational target of reducing waste to landfill by 10% per person by 2030.
- Engineering Services Manager Richard Kirby paid tribute to Ken Beck and David Blunt, two former Waimea County Council engineers who have passed away over the past two months. Both made a significant contribution to our District. Our condolences to their families.
- Received the results of the Nelson Tasman speed limits survey. More information on page 8.

### Residents give insights into our performance

More than three-quarters of Tasman residents feel we have a good or very good reputation – one of the many insights from our annual residents' survey.

The survey has revealed that most residents are happy with how we're operating, though there are areas we can improve. The National Research Bureau undertook the survey and heard from 401 people across our five wards.

The highest levels of satisfaction were in relation to users connected to our sewerage system (94 per cent), public libraries, and recreational facilities, both of which achieved 91 per cent satisfaction. The highest levels where residents noted dissatisfaction were with our roads (32 per cent), our stormwater services (19 per cent) and footpaths (17 per cent).

In comparing the 2018 results, there was a 19 per cent increase in satisfaction for emergency management, which may reflect our contribution to the devastating drought and fires our region faced this year.

We also saw a 10 per cent increase in satisfaction for users of our public toilets, which may be attributed to new toilets around the region and also the more regular cleaning/maintenance regime we have implemented over the past year. Seventy per cent think we supply more than enough or enough information, and most of that information comes via Newsline, with local newspapers second.

Forty-two percent of respondents could cite a recent Council action or decision they approve of, and 38 per cent had one they disapproved of (which is down from 52 per cent last year). While that's on par with the national average, we would like to see it improve.

This year we also asked questions to assist with our Responsible Camping Strategy. Just over three-quarters of Tasman people support controlled freedom camping in the region.

We also asked residents about their housing preferences. The overall result indicates a preference for lifestyle properties, but older people (which is the age group projected to make up most of our future growth) indicate a preference for smaller stand-alone houses.

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# WATER MATTERS

## Waimea Community Dam construction officially underway

A ground-breaking ceremony at the Lee Valley Waimea Community Dam site earlier this month formally marked the start of the dam build. The dam is a significant infrastructure project for Nelson Tasman that will provide reliable access to water for urban and rural communities, and bring environmental improvements, for the next 100-plus years.

Members of the Waimea Water Ltd board and staff, together with representatives from the Tasman District Council, Waimea Irrigators, iwi and the contractor – a joint venture between Fulton Hogan and Taylors Contracting - were joined by Nelson MP the Hon Dr Nick Smith and other key stakeholders at the event.

Waimea Water board chairwoman Karen Jordan says: "This year's drought further emphasised the need for greater water security in the region.

"The dam will provide a reliable water supply for the region when we need it most. Research shows that New Zealand gets plenty of water each year and uses less than two percent of it for abstraction. It's clear that we need to be smarter about storing it while also considering and minimising the impact on the environment."

The dam will have environmental benefits as well, including healthier Lee and Waimea Rivers. It will also improve water quality to provide a better environment for plants, fish and animals and create more opportunities for people to enjoy fishing, swimming and other recreational activities all year round.

Mayor Richard Kempthorne says this is one of the most important infrastructure projects we're ever likely to see in the region.

"The dam is a game-changer for Nelson Tasman, it secures household water for our urban community and will grow our primary industries, as well as make sure a healthy level of water is maintained in the Lee and Waimea Rivers at all times."

Waimea Water chief executive Mike Scott says the three-year construction project is progressing well.

"Works to create access to the Lee Valley site are almost complete and we're looking forward to now getting started on the construction of this world class dam and major infrastructure asset for the region." The Waimea Community Dam will be New Zealand's first large dam in over 20 years. It will be approximately 53 metres high, 220 metres long and 6 metres wide at the crest. At times, there will be more than 100 people working on the project, many of them local.

Construction is scheduled to be complete in 2021, with the reservoir filling and final commissioning expected in early 2022.

### Recommendations for the future of Takaka's water

A new report into freshwater management in Takaka makes a range of recommendations to help improve freshwater management in the catchments from Wainui Bay to Tukurua, including the Takaka River and its tributaries.

The report, by the Takaka Freshwater and Land Advisory Group (FLAG), covers water allocation, water quality management, and water body restoration. It was accompanied by a report, Manawhenua Mātauranga Report for the Tākaka Catchments, from Manawhenua ki Mohua, which outlined iwi freshwater management principles, values and aspirations for the future.

We set up the FLAG as a community-led advisory group to help us develop ways to manage freshwater resources and meet the obligations of the National Policy Statement for Freshwater Management. The FLAG report recommends a number of new water controls for the area, and asks the Council to consider how they can be effectively and efficiently implemented.

One of the FLAG recommendations is to implement new flow and water quality protections for Te Waikoropupū Springs as soon as possible, which will complement the protections anticipated from the Water Conservation Order process.

The FLAG says the recommendations are an integrated package that is intended to operate as a holistic framework.

"We have worked hard to reach a consensus on these issues," FLAG spokesperson Mik Symmons says. "We would like to see the Council adopt our recommendations and progress their implementation to improve freshwater management in our catchments."

We will now consider the recommendations and their implications for the Takaka community, and decide how best to progress the remaining work.

Mayor Richard Kempthorne acknowledged the significant amount of time that FLAG members gave to the report, and says the Council will now seek to fully understand the package's implications for the whole community.

"We are very grateful to all of the FLAG members for their effort, passion and persistence during this process."

### Young people contribute to climate change planning

We've been working with youth leaders and Zero Carbon Nelson Tasman to develop an initial plan for responding to climate change.

Climate change is happening now and the impacts on the environment and people are predicted to worsen over time and continue for many generations.

It's widely accepted internationally that the costs of inaction or delayed action outweigh the cost of acting now. We are committed to doing what we can to protect our community and help it adjust to this global threat.

This year Tasman District councillors, staff, Enviroleaders from local secondary schools, and the Zero Carbon Nelson Tasman group have been working together to identify and prioritise actions that we can take in response to climate change. Our initial response will be focused on what we can do in-house as a first step.

The draft Tasman Climate Action Plan includes themes on mitigation, adaptation, and leadership; that is, how we can reduce greenhouse gas emissions from our activities; ways we can respond to our changing environment, including positive opportunities; and how we can lead by example, advocate, and encourage others to take action.

One of our medium-term aims is to work collaboratively with Nelson City Council, iwi and communities across Nelson and Tasman to develop a broader strategy for responding to climate change. The draft Tasman Climate Action Plan will be considered at the Full Council meeting on 12 September 2019.

This work complements our ongoing coastal hazards consultation across the district. Consultation started in August and is focused on raising awareness within our community of the effects of sea level rise and coastal hazards. We have prepared a map, which is available on our website, showing various sea level rise scenarios and the impacts on coastal properties. Feedback is open until 13 September 2019.

### Motueka next for broadband rollout

Motueka's ultra-fast broadband rollout should be complete by the end of this year. Ruby Bay's fibre was finished recently, meaning contractors now move to finish Motueka.

Over the next three years, improved rural broadband and cellular coverage to tourist locations and mobile blackspots will continue to be extended around the District.

#### Check what's available on the broadband map

If you want to know which broadband options are available at your address, visit the National Broadband Map. Simply enter your address and you will see which options are available.

#### What if I'm not happy with my broadband installation?

If you're not happy with the quality of your installation, you can follow a process for dispute resolution. Check with your internet provider and ask about the dispute resolution scheme for fibre services.

#### Background

Over the past seven years, the Council has worked with central Government to help deliver better internet to our District, including \$35 million funding for:

- Ultrafast Fibre Broadband, aimed at urban areas including small towns;
- Rural Broadband (RBI) for rural areas, and
- improved cellular coverage for tourist areas and current mobile blackspots.

### Should we change how we vote? It's up to you

Tick or rank? When you receive your local body election voting papers this year, you'll also be asked to choose which voting system you'd like to use in future elections. The poll results will be binding for the 2022 and 2025 elections.

### The options are Single Transferable Vote (STV) or First Past the Post (FPP).

#### First Past the Post

In FPP, voters tick a candidate and the person who receives the most votes is elected. This is the current system for the Tasman District Council election.

#### Single Transferable Vote

In STV, voters rank candidates in order of their preference, giving a 1 to the favourite candidate, 2 to the next preferred person and so on. A candidate must reach the quota to be elected.

Where there is more than one vacancy, all candidates who reach the quota are

elected until all the spaces are filled. This system is used for the Nelson-Marlborough District Health Board elections. For more information on STV, visit stv.govt.nz.

There is no additional cost for processing and/or counting votes under either system.

#### Why is there a voting system poll?

FPP has been used for all Tasman District Council elections up until this point. This year you have the option of voting for change because a valid public petition representing at least 5% of those on the 2016 electoral roll requested a poll on the method of voting for future elections.

### Taiwan cherry - a pretty pest

It may be pretty, but it's now officially a pest. Taiwan cherry (*Prunus campanulata*) can no longer be propagated, sold or planted in Nelson or Tasman.

With the new Tasman-Nelson Regional Pest Management Plan (RPMP) for 2019-2029 in force from July 1, Tasman biosecurity staff will be out helping residents stop this pest tree from taking over our landscapes.

The tree, which is also known as bell-flowered cherry or Formosan cherry, has been spreading through the Richmond Ranges and other areas of scrubland or where grazing pressure is low. It forms dense, long-lived stands that choke out native vegetation.

Landowners must report the presence of Taiwan cherry and its cultivars on their land within five working days of sighting, and organise removal. For those who have planted the trees as specimens, our biosecurity staff will be helping remove them by providing replacement trees to the value of \$135, after confirmation the pest tree or trees are gone. On a case by case basis, we will negotiate a financial contribution towards removal.



### Speed limits survey results are in

Earlier this year close to 2000 Tasman and Nelson residents shared their views on safe and appropriate speed limits across our region through our joint Tasman District Council-Nelson City Council speed survey.

The survey gave us valuable insights into the speed limits you think are suitable for our roads.

The Government's new road safety strategy Road to Zero sets out principles for strengthening New Zealand's road transport system, including setting safe and appropriate speeds. New Zealand Transport Agency guidance has told us that many of our rural roads have a safe and appropriate speed of 80kmh or less and many residential streets have a safe and appropriate speed of 40kmh. The survey results show that there is a high level of support and understanding for reduced speed limits on some of our roads, including narrow sealed rural roads and residential roads around schools. For example, 76% of respondents think we should have a legal speed limit that is safe and appropriate for the road type, rather than the historic blanket 100kmh rural and 50kmh urban speed limits.

#### Next steps

The outcomes of the survey, the Government's speed management guidance, a review of requested changes to road speed limits and the need to have consistent implementation of speeds across our roading network means we are planning to propose a range of changes to speed limits across our District.

At a meeting on 12 September, the Council will decide whether to begin consultation on changes to our Speed Limits Bylaw in order to implement the proposed new limits.

#### **KEY SURVEY RESULTS**

91% think we should have a speed limit less than 100kmh on our unsealed rural, narrow, winding roads. **81%** think we should have a speed limit less than 50kmh on our busy residential/school roads.

### Manage your fire permit online

Fire permits can now be managed online as Nelson Tasman Fire and Emergency works to educate the public on the risk of fire.

You can check the fire season status in your area, check the progress of your application, view and activate fire permits, and apply to renew any expired or declined fire permit applications.

Most of Nelson-Tasman is currently in a restricted fire season, so you will need a permit to light many types of fire.

"Fire permits are a key part of Fire and Emergency's strategy to reduce the risk of fire, particularly over the summer fire season," risk reduction national manager Roxanne Hilliard says. "Fire permitting allows us to engage with New Zealanders to advise them about the types of fire they can or can't light in the prevailing conditions, and to ensure they have the knowledge to manage the fire safely. This reduces the instances of uncontrolled fire emergencies."

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#### Drag racing at Motueka Aerodrome

### Have your say on the publicly notified resource consent application

Nelson Drag Racing Association is seeking resource consent for four drag racing events a year for 10 years at the Motueka Aerodrome, 124 Queen Victoria Street, Motueka. This is a replacement consent for their existing one that expired on 11 May 2019.

The drag racing would be held on Saturdays – with a backup day to the next day (Sunday) for two of the events – any National Race or Easter Saturday event. This might involve all or part of an event on that next day to complete the whole race programme.

Events would run between 10.00 am and 4.00 pm on a Saturday, but could be extended to 5.00 pm in some circumstances. On any backup Sunday, events would start no earlier than 10.00 am and finish by 4.00 pm.

#### The proposal includes:

- up to 3000 people attending any single event;
- parking for at least 1000 cars will be provided;
- signage is limited to a single sign; and
- no tyre popping to occur.

#### Flush your taps

### How should we respond to higher sea levels?

### Join our climate change community consultation.

Tasman is experiencing stormier weather as climate change hits harder, and we're preparing our communities for new weather patterns, rising sea levels and changing coastal hazards. We've been working on a project to prepare Tasman to adapt to this new normal.

While the rate and magnitude of future sea level rise is uncertain, we do know that it will happen. This will have increasingly urgent implications for coastal development and infrastructure, such as roads, housing, and boating. There will also be environmental, cultural and social effects.

As a starting point for the conversation, we've mapped land that may be affected by sea level rise. The maps show a range of scenarios, as well as the effect of higher tides caused by storms, areas of historic coastal erosion (sediment loss) and accretion (sediment gain), and the presence of coastal structures such as stopbanks, walls and rock revetments.

These maps are available on our website. We need to hear about what is important to you and what we should do as sea levels rise and we experience more severe weather.

The engagement programme runs until 13 September. It is the first opportunity to

talk about the effect of sea level rise for our communities, but it won't be the last; this long term planning will take several years to complete.

### Sinking lid policy proposed for pokie machine numbers

We're proposing to change how we manage 'pokie' machine numbers in Tasman and introduce a sinking lid policy.

#### Our aim – to minimise harmful gambling

The proposed draft policy is intended to provide a level of control that will minimise harmful gambling associated with class 4 gaming machines (sometimes called pokies) in the District.

In practice, the draft policy prohibits the gaming societies that own and operate the gaming machines from increasing the number of gaming machines they are licensed to operate.

The policy also continues the prohibition on transferring of any class 4 venue licence within the District.
