

Your new representatives announced

The preliminary results are in and Tasman's new mayor, councillors and community board members have been announced.

The preliminary results were close in some wards, so it is possible there will be changes once the final count is announced. The final count wasn't in at the time Newsline went to print – head to our website for the latest information, tasman.govt.nz/link/elections.

Your new mayor is Tim King. Tim said "A big thank you to everyone who voted. It's so important people participate in the process because the decisions Councils make affect the services and infrastructure people use on a daily basis. I'm looking forward to working with the new group of councillors from around the District and to fostering positive engagement with our community. It's going to be a busy three years with plenty of challenges."

Incumbent councillors David Ogilvie, Dean McNamara, Anne Turley, Mark Greening, Kit Maling, Trevor Tuffnell and Dana Wensley are joined by five new councillors (pictured below).

Subject to the final count, Dave Gowland, Averill Grant, Grant Knowles and Abbie Langford will represent their community on the Golden Bay Community Board for the next three years.

In Motueka, the Community Board welcomes David Armstrong, Richard Horrell, Brent Maru and Joni Tomsett.

The preliminary results told us about 19,845 of you cast your votes in the local body election (this number excludes special

votes) – equating to 51.67% of eligible voters (up from 49.36% in 2016).

Golden Bay was the most active voting area, with turnout of 63.55% (again, not including special votes).

The mayor and councillors will be sworn in at an inaugural meeting on Thursday 24 October at the Motueka Memorial Hall. They will take their oath of office, promising to act in the best interests of the whole District. The oath commits councillors to balance their responsibility to raise issues affecting their wards with their responsibility to make decisions on behalf of the interests of the whole community, including future generations.

Responsible camping strategy open for feedback

Consultation open from 14 October – 18 November 2019

Generations of New Zealanders have enjoyed summers camping in Tasman District, at Kaiteriteri, Totaranui, Māpua and a range of our other beautiful holiday destinations.

Over the past few years the number of campers in both self-contained and non self-contained vehicles has increased dramatically, particularly in Motueka and Golden Bay. The increase in budget and freedom campers has come with challenges, including littering, waste disposal, noise, public space conflicts, safety and commercial competition concerns.

We want to continue to be welcoming hosts to people wishing to enjoy the uniquely Tasman experience, and we expect our visitors to respect the special places and communities they pass through.

The draft Responsible Camping Strategy is intended to provide direction as we manage responsible camping through regulations and by providing facilities and visitor information. It may lead to future rule changes through the Tasman Freedom Camping Bylaw.

We've been talking to a wide range of groups and organisations to develop the draft, including Te Tau Ihu iwi.

Rainfall below average across Tasman District

As mentioned previously in Newsline, there are already strong indications that we could be set to face another water shortage this summer. The rainfall we've had across the region so far this year is well below average.

At this stage, we are facing the real possibility of introducing water restrictions and this year they will be different.

We recently amended the Public Water Supply Bylaw. The bylaw applies to properties that use the public network. One of the main changes is that water restriction "stages" have been replaced with "phases" to give more flexibility in managing the supply and more clarity to different types of water users. Water restrictions include six phases - A to F - with different restrictions applying to homes, businesses and public organisations. Irrigators will stay on numeric stages. This will make it easier to distinguish which restrictions apply to which users.

You can see the full list of phases on our website, tasman.govt.nz/link/water-restrictions plus there will be a handy look-up tool available soon. You'll simply click on the location of your home or business and see the restrictions that currently apply in that area.

But let's not wait for the situation to get worse. There's a whole lot we can do right now about the amount of water we use to help delay the start of restrictions. Check out these top tips and see more great ideas on our website:

- Never put water down the drain when there may be another use for it such as watering plants or cleaning.
- Always fix any leaks in fittings or taps on your property.
- If you suspect a leak on public property, call us right away so we can look into it.
 We rely on the public to let us know if there is a problem.
- Keep showers short. A three-minute shower uses less than half the water needed for a bath.
- Turn the tap off when brushing your teeth or shaving.
- Wash vegetables or rinse dishes in a bowl of water, then re-use the water in the garden.

New water supply coming to north-west Motueka

This month, work began on installing a new water supply system in the north-west urban area of Motueka.

The work includes installing new water pipes, meter boxes, valves and hydrants in parts of the following streets:

- · Atkins Street
- Pah Street
- · Fry Street
- · Parker Street
- · Hulbert Street
- Poole Street
- Jocelyn Avenue
- Wilkie Street
- Michael Myers Street

This project will enhance the drinking water supply in the area, provide new points for water connections and ensure there is sufficient water flow for firefighting.

We have contracted C J Industries Ltd to do this work. CJ's will be in touch directly with affected residents prior to beginning work in each street.

In the meantime, you can view the programme of work to find out when CJ's will be in each street, by visiting tasman.govt.nz - search phrase "Motueka new water".

There may be times when vehicle access to properties is temporarily unavailable. The contractor will work with residents to minimise any inconvenience. We thank you in advance for your patience and cooperation during this work.

New home for Motueka's motorhome dump station

There is a new dump station in Motueka (where self-contained camping vehicles empty their waste tanks) at the western end of Marchwood Park Road, near the airport, off Queen Victoria Street.

This will replace the dump station at the Hickmott Place carpark which has created issues over recent years.

The new facility has two dump units that will work for both left and right discharging vehicles, offers untreated water for wash down and potable water so people can refill their water tanks.

Signs are up on the state highway and relevant streets, directing people to the new location, as well as at the former Hickmott Place site.

The new facility will be up and running by mid-October, and the Hickmott place dumpstation will be closed after that. Signs at Hickmott Place will show people where the new dumpstation can be found.





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Flood prevention work planned for Ned's Creek

This summer, we will build a stop-bank at Ned's Creek in Murchison to reduce flooding experienced by nearby properties during heavy rain.

We plan to build a small levee (stop-bank) between Ned's Creek and some of the properties on Hampden Street. The levee will extend eastwards around the recreation centre, to cut-off any overland water flow from further upstream. We are also installing a new culvert in the stream.

During heavy rain, the new culvert will hold back any water that can't fit in the stream channel. The levee will allow water to collect in the paddock on the southern side of Ned's Creek, preventing it from reaching residents' properties. Once the rain has passed, excess water will drain away at a rate that the stream can handle

Work is scheduled to be carried out between February and May 2020.

Dawn ceremony opens new Te Maatu/Thorp Bush entranceway

A safe, welcoming entranceway to Motueka's Te Maatu/Thorp Bush is now open after a dawn blessing earlier this month.


Visitors to the 4.5ha reserve can now enter the park down Woodlands Avenue through two pou gifted by Ngāti Rārua Ātiawa Iwi Trust (NRAIT) representing the ancestors of Te Rūnanga o Ngāti Rārua and Te Ātiawa Manawhenua Ki Te Tau Ihu: Te Poa Karoro on the Ngāti Rārua side and Horoatua on the Te Ātiawa side.

NRAIT chair Ropata Taylor says the ancestors identify Te Maatu as "a really significant site for us".

"Te Maatu was a giant podocarp forest covering the area that today is the town of Moteuka, and Thorp Bush is one of only two pockets of the original forest that remains, and it's incredibly important to us. That's why we gifted the carvings, because we wanted to celebrate and acknowledge what was here in the past."

The area was also potato grounds for families. "It was in many respects an exercise in companion planting where local people were coexisting with the natural environment, and for us there's a whole lot of important messages around that."

In 2015, the Motueka Youth Council identified anti-social behaviour and perceptions of safety as an issue at Te Maatu/Thorp Bush and came up with a plan to redevelop the entrance area. The project received funding and support from the Ministry of Youth Development, Motueka Community Board and Tasman District Council. "We are encouraging a change of attitude to one of appreciating the park's value culturally, historically and ecologically," Motueka and Golden Bay horticultural officer Lynne Hall says.



New sculpture celebrates a community of travellers

A community sculpture initiated by the Motueka Arts Council was unveiled last month at its site alongside the Motueka marina.

Named 'Arrivals and Departures', or 'Ngā taenga māi me ngā wehenga, the 5m high, 10m long sculpture features an early Māori waka bringing in our first settlers, a whale's tail, a European schooner's sail, and godwits. It thus represents the comings and goings of the people and products of the Motueka community, with its popular tourism industry, seasonal workers and changing tides, seasons and crops.

It was created by Motueka artist Maeve Allen using stainless steel, with her trademark hand-cut and broken mosaic tiles. Its unveiling coincided with the annual return of the godwits to the Motueka Sandspit from Alaska.

Allen says the sculpture is for everyone. "For all those who are

arriving and leaving this amazing town, as well as all of those leaving their comfort zones and discovering new experiences in this weird and wonderful journey we call life," she says.

Local businesses offering support included Infield Engineering, CJ Industries and AMK, and the sculpture received funding from many different people and sources including Tasman District Council. The site upon which it now stands was gifted by the Motueka Power Boat Club.







Hundreds share views on planning for sea-level rise

In July, we launched our coastal management project to enable our Tasman Bay/Te Tai o Aorere and Golden Bay/Mohua communities to work towards long-term adaptive planning for sea level rise and coastal hazards.

More than 300 of you attended our community drop-in sessions in Richmond, Mapua/Ruby Bay, Motueka, Takaka and Collingwood. As well, 150 people and organisations completed our online survey or provided written feedback. Many thanks to everyone who contributed, and congratulations to Imogen from Golden Bay High School who won the youth feedback prize draw of a UE Wonderboom Bluetooth speaker.

The initial round of community engagement has now closed but this was just the first opportunity to have your say – how we respond to climate change and sea level rise will be an ongoing conversation for the Council and community. At this early stage, our focus has been on raising awareness, developing a common understanding of the information, and gathering your feedback on what you value that may be affected by sea level rise and coastal hazards. This will help us understand what is most important to people and communities and will help inform options for future coastal management.

The information we have gathered will be summarised into a report that will be publicly available in the coming months. The next step will be to identify areas, objects or experiences that we value that may be impacted by future sea level rise and coastal hazards, and assess their risk and vulnerability. This work will take several years to complete and the community conversation will be ongoing.

Controlling Argentine and Darwin ants

Thousands of households and businesses in our region now have an infestation of Argentine or Darwin ants. These ants build up massive colonies and can have a significant negative impact on indoor and outdoor living.

Both ant species are inadvertently spread by any medium that contains an ant colony.

For example, ants can be spread to other areas via infested pot plants, potting mixes, firewood, goods held in storage, landscaping supplies, bark chips, topsoil and building and other materials sourced from ant infested areas.

Before arranging for any supply from a potentially infested area, ask that the supplier can guarantee that their goods are free of any ant contamination. Any vehicle, boat, caravan or motorhome that has been stationary in an infested area is at risk of having a colony

on board and should be checked and treated before leaving your neighbourhood.

Spring is the most effective time to treat infestations to slow the rate of expansion of ant colonies – so now is a great time to treat your property for ants.

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Children's fishing days coming up

The Sports Fishing for Youth Trust is a charitable trust that aims to give young people in the region an opportunity to go fishing and appreciate the outdoors. With the support of sponsors, the trust has built three children-friendly fishing ponds at Appleby. With assistance from Nelson Marlborough Fish and Game it stocks these ponds with trout and salmon.

Trustees and volunteers use the ponds to provide youngsters with a guided fishing opportunity at designated fishout days.

The first guided fishing spell is between 13 October and 20 December each year and the second spell is between 1 April and 31 May. During these periods fishing is permitted on the designated fishout days under the guidance of a trustee.

It is essential to book children in for a time slot for the guided fishout days through the trust's website, youthfishing.org.nz. Check with the website or the trust's Facebook page for fishout date announcements. The actual dates depend on factors such as fish availability, maintenance requirements, and weather.

The ponds are available for children to fish with a parent's supervision between 20 December 2019 and 31 March 2020. Please check the website for guidelines.

From time to time the trust makes the ponds available for other groups and provides fishing opportunities for special needs groups, the disabled, the elderly, and groups such as Casting for Recovery.

Tasman District Council is pleased to support the Sports Fishing for Youth Trust through our Community Grants scheme.



Annual report highlights our highs and lows

Our annual report is now available on our website, and outlines the challenges we have faced throughout the year as well as our achievements. Despite the severe drought and the Pigeon Valley fire last summer, we have kept focus on our planned work programme.

We instigated water restrictions during the drought. The community and business efforts to conserve water were phenomenal, meaning we could delay further restrictions at each stage.

During the Pigeon Valley fire, the combined efforts of hundreds of volunteers, firefighters, Council staff from Tasman, Nelson and around the country, iwi, civil defence staff, Police, NZ Defence Force, Ministry of Primary Industries and Red Cross meant we were able to respond to the fire in a collaboration that has been nationally recognised.

As well as the Waimea Community Dam, for which site works began in March, we've started or finished several other key growthrelated infrastructure projects across the District.

With the effects of climate change already being felt, we have finalised a Climate Action Plan that will help our communities mitigate and adapt to its challenges as well as come up with new solutions.

Developing enduring partnerships with the eight Te Tau Ihu iwi and Ngāi Tahu is especially important for us and in May this year, Council approved the appointment of a Kaihautū, who will help us build our capacity for improved partnerships. Many of our staff have also taken the opportunity to improve their knowledge of te reo and Te Ao Māori.

Looking forward to 2019/2020, we will be continuing progress on key projects, particularly the Waimea Community Dam, the Motueka Library, and Port Tarakohe redevelopment, and our key strategic plans, including the Climate Action Plan, the Te Tauihu Intergenerational Strategy, and the review of the Tasman Resource Policy Statement and Tasman Resource Management Plan.

Congratulations to the new mayor of Westerkwartier in the Netherlands

A video message from Mayor Richard Kempthorne was shown at the swearing in of the new Mayor of the municipality Westerkwartier in the Netherlands.

The new municipality comes from the amalgamation of Grootegast, Leek, Marum and Zuidhorn. Tasman has a friendly communities relationship with Grootegast.

Mayor van der Tuuk is the first crownappointed mayor of Westerkwartier. Mayor Kempthorne couldn't attend the swearing in in person, so instead he recorded a congratulating video message in Dutch, which was shown at the event and watched by 500 people.

Mayor van der Tuuk and Mayor Kempthorne both signed a copy of the friendly communities relationship document in 2017, during the 375th anniversary of the arrival in Golden Bay of Dutch explorer Abel Janszoon Tasman and the first recorded encounter with Maori. The relationship document is designed to encourage economic and cultural relations between the two areas.

Have your say on this publicly notified resource consent application

Tasman District Council's Engineering Services Department is seeking resource consents for the ongoing operation, maintenance and renewal of parts of the Council's urban stormwater networks, which service 15 townships across the District. These Urban Development Areas are:

Summary details of resource consent application number RM191015

The locations covered include both the existing Urban Development Areas, and any future extensions needed to service the urban growth of these townships. Work programmes for expansion of the current network will be developed through individual catchment management plans that will be prepared as part of the consent requirements.

While the main features are the stormwater discharges from these networks, the proposal also includes other aspects of use, operation and maintenance of the networks that require consent. The application covers:

- the discharges of water and contaminants from the urban stormwater networks;
- the management of stormwater and discharges of contaminants from extensions to the Urban Development Areas to service future urban growth as identified through individual catchment management plans;

- · the ongoing use of existing physical Council stormwater infrastructure in zones where this is not a permitted activity, specifically the Open Space, Recreation, Conservation, Rural Industrial, and Papakainga Zones; and
- the maintenance, repair, upgrade and renewal of the physical network, including short-term associated construction activities and temporary discharges of contaminants.

- use the correct form (available on our website);
- make sure the Council receives it by 4.30 pm on Friday 15 November 2019; and
- provide the applicant with a copy of your submission too.

Mobile dishwashing trailer grows in popularity

The Wash Against Waste trailer, run by Waste No More Whakatū, has been a familiar sight at community events lately as our communities work to reduce waste.

The trailer is a mobile wash station and store cupboard that contains crockery, cutlery and cups so food outlets don't have to use paper and plastic takeaway containers and cutlery. Punters can borrow crockery or hire stainless-steel dinnerware for a refundable bond.

Nelson City Council initially seed-funded the trailer and we have supported it by providing 100 reusable recycled-plastic cups from Motueka company IdealCup for people to borrow.

The trailer was created over the winter and launched at two recent events, the Hope School Country Fair and the Motueka Steiner School Spring Fair. At the end of the fair, there was just one bag of rubbish set for landfill.

The trailer is set to be very popular, partnerships and education officer Nichola Brydon says.

"Now that it's been piloted and perfected, people are starting to request it and it's going to be well-used."
