New Motueka Library set to open soon

The brand new Motueka Library is just days away from its grand opening, with the Wallace Street facility set to welcome the public from 9.30 am on Saturday 19 March.

The handover of the 1,100 square metre building – a \$5 million project – at Deck's Reserve took place in December and final touches and fitout have been taking place in recent weeks.

The library features a community room catering for up to 50 people.

The space is equipped with presentation and video conferencing technology for community meetings, events and workshops.

Solar panels have been installed to create sustainable power.

"The team are so excited about the new library, and we can't wait to deliver our services here and welcome the community," Motueka Branch Librarian Janine Gillions said.

Please note that under the Covid Protection Framework Red setting, we'll need to limit the number of people who can be in the library at the same time. People may need to wait to come into the library. However, we'll be celebrating the library's opening all week, so there'll be plenty of opportunities to see the new setup in its first few days.

Pah Street Library

Our former library premises on Pah Street will be closed from 1.00 pm on Saturday 5 March. The after-hours returns bin will close at this time, so no returns can be accepted until the new library opens. However, no books will fall due during this time, so you may want to take out some extra books to cover you for the two-week closure.

Wetland being rebuilt for endangered birds

The first stage of a wetland creation project designed to enhance the ecological value of Waimea Delta is about to begin.

The multi-stage project will encompass the creation of freshwater wetland areas in a low-lying arm of the Waimea River, just east of Pearl Creek. The site is adjacent to salt marsh and downstream from the cycle bridge along Tasman's Great Taste Trail.



Over the next three weeks, work will focus on creating small ponds alongside the existing channel to increase the area of open water.

The work will be undertaken by experienced operators from both Downer and the Council.

The Delta project is part of the Waimea Inlet Enhancement Project, funded by the Ministry for the Environment and Tasman District Council.

Project manager George Daly said the site has been selected as having huge potential for restoring habitat for marsh birds such as Matuku (Australasian Bittern).

It will also provide a beneficial habitat for other species, including

īnanga, kōkopu, eels and everything that feeds on them.

"There are limited freshwater wetland sites left that are adjacent to salt marsh, particularly in Tasman Bay. This makes this site an important opportunity for building ecological linkages. River delta systems are known worldwide to have some of the richest biodiversity," George says.

Terrestrial planting around the area is planned over winter, followed by further wetland planting in spring.

Phase two will take place in early 2023.

The broader work plan includes widening channels and creating new swamps and marsh to create diverse wildlife habitats and enhance habitat connectivity.

Future Development Strategy consultation goes online

Tasman District Council and Nelson City Council are working on a joint 2022 Future Development Strategy (FDS).

The FDS is a strategic plan that covers residential and business potential sites within the Nelson and Tasman regions over the next 30 years.

The strategy looks at how and where we can create more capacity for development (for housing and business) and identifies the infrastructure required to support it.

The FDS does not rezone the land, but it informs our Resource Management Plans. Before the FDS is adopted by both councils, we are going out for consultation so you can have your say.

This consultation will run from 14 March 2022 to 14 April 2022. Hearings are scheduled for April and May and following deliberations the FDS may be adopted by both councils in July 2022.

To ensure any business or residential growth occurs in a way that best benefits those who live here now and over the next 30 years we need your input.

The FDS will influence all of our futures, where we will be able to live, the availability of housing and the types of housing we, our children and grandchildren will be able to live in.

To keep everyone safe while we are at Red on the Covid Protection Framework, in-person community consultation events will not take place. Instead, we have a comprehensive online consultation programme.

Engagement on the way for growth plan changes

We are also working on a plan change to rezone land for housing in Murchison, Brightwater and Wakefield and to enable higher densities on residentially zoned land in Māpua and Motueka.

A plan change is normally the next step in the process following the adoption of the FDS. However, in this case the FDS and the plan change to

rezone land are working concurrently to enable Tasman to meet its growing demand for housing.

We expect Tasman to remain a desirable area to live in the future.

As we prepare to meet this potential demand, we want to have your input into how we can best accommodate the expected growth in our region and the proposed plan change areas and rules.

The plan change will go through a formal process of notification, submissions, hearings and decision making.

This consultation will run at the same time as the FDS consultation, from 14 March 2022 through to 14 April 2022.

How Air Aware are you?

The air we breathe has a massive impact on our health and our lives. It may look clean and clear, but on closer inspection there are many small particles that can make their way into our lungs and can lead to a range of health problems.

These microscopic specks are officially known as 'particulate matter' and are labelled PM_{10} for the larger ones and $PM_{2.5}$ for the tiniest of particles.

Breathing in these fine traces of pollution can lead to coughing and breathing difficulties. They can aggravate asthma and harm our cardiovascular systems.

The particles come from numerous sources, but here in Tasman they mostly come from wood burning

from home heating and outdoor burning, industrial emissions, exhaust fumes from vehicles and wind-blown dust, pollen and even sea salt.

Like it or not, winter is just around the corner and that's when our air quality is at its worst in Tasman.

To highlight the issue this month we're running a special awareness campaign, including a competition, to encourage our community to investigate what we can do to improve air quality both at home and in the workplace.

We've also released a new air quality information booklet that includes extremely useful tips on how you can help our air stay healthy.

Fish Passage project starts swimmingly

We are excited to be progressing our Jobs for Nature project to improve fish diversity and abundance in the Tasman region.

The focus of this fish passage work is to support private landowners by assessing any in-stream structures (such as culverts) and completing remediation when required and within the scope of the project funding.



This work is happening as part of the Government's Jobs for Nature Freshwater Improvement Fund projects, made possible with funding provided by the Ministry for the Environment and Tasman District Council.

Currently work is being completed in Sherry River/Tadmor and beginning in Riwaka, Aorere Valley and selected areas of the Moutere as part of the start-up phase.

While only just the start, 200 assessments, 34 remediations and one fish survey have already been completed.

Once the initial start-up phase is complete, work will focus on the Golden Bay region, moving

systematically by catchment. Over the five-year project, additional areas will be added.

Landowners with in-stream structures in waterways can expect to hear directly from the dedicated, trained team from Kūmānu Environmental (a division of Nelmac), who have been contracted to carry out the work.

The team will arrange a scheduled day to assess any in-structures and if possible, will remediate on the same visit or schedule a subsequent visit to complete.

Recognising Roger Tait

Roger and the Tait family have been part of the Golden Bay Recreation Park and wider sporting scene for more than fifty years.

Following in his father lan's footsteps, he became voluntary caretaker of the park in 2000.

For the past 20-years, until last year, Roger was the President of the Golden Bay Recreation Park committee, working with the clubs using the fields, the volunteers who set out signage and seating for home games and the locals who mowed the fields.

He's an honorary life member of the Tākaka Rugby Club and has served ten years on the Golden Bay Shared Recreation Facility Inc. He was part of the committee that worked through the planning and development of the new councilcommunity facility and has been on the governance board since 2016.

Sandeman Reserve barrier arms to be installed

To ensure public safety in the unlikely event of an emergency, we recently approved an easement for the installation and ongoing operation of barrier arms over two sections of Tasman's Great Taste Trail within Sandeman Reserve, Richmond.

AICA New Zealand Limited operate a manufacturing plant at 35 Sandeman Road, Richmond, making glue for Nelson Pine and other wood processing operators. The facility adjoins Sandeman Reserve, where a section of Tasman's Great Taste Trail passes through.

Under WorkSafe legislation, AICA's facility has been classified as a Major Hazardous Facility. As such, they are required to be able to shut off access along the trail that runs through the Reserve in the event of an accidental toxic gas release.

At our recent Regulatory Committee meeting, an easement was granted over two very small sections of Sandeman Reserve to install two solar powered, remote controlled barrier arms that would only be lowered in an emergency event

where there is a potential danger posed to the public.

The barrier arms will provide a warning system with flashing lights and restrict access until the site is made safe.

AICA will meet all costs associated with obtaining the easement and installing and maintaining the barrier arms, so there will be no cost to the Council.

Installation of the barrier arms will begin in the coming weeks.



Salisbury Road watermain works are about to begin

We're about to start work upgrading the water supply network along Salisbury Road. The existing pipework is old and fragile, so the new network will minimise the risk of pipes breaking and water supply disruptions.

This involves installing two new watermains on Salisbury Road (one between William Street and Templemore Drive and the other between William Street and Arbor-Lea Avenue) and installing new water connections to all properties between William Street and Holdaway Grove.

To minimise disruption, work will be done in sections, starting at the corner of William Street and Salisbury Road on Monday 7 March and continuing down Salisbury Road towards Champion Road. We expect all work to be finished in July 2022.


These works will cause some congestion, so please be patient, expect delays and use an alternative route if you can.

We plan to maintain two-way traffic for all works during the day, but there will be sections of the road where restricted lane sizes and reduced speeds are in place. Works that cross or are in the middle of Salisbury Road will be done at night with stop/go traffic management in place.

Footpaths and cycle lanes may also be affected in some areas, with diversions in place for pedestrians and cyclists. Bus services, including school pickups and drop-offs, will continue as normal but there may be some delays. If you are a parent dropping your child at a school or early childcare centre along Salisbury Road, please consider using an alternative drop-off point during the works.

Vote 2022

Local government elections are happening throughout Aotearoa this year. Postal voting opens in late September and closes on election day, 8 October. If you want to have a say in the future direction of Tasman District, either by standing for election or voting, you must first be enrolled to vote.

You are eligible if you are 18 years or older, a New Zealand citizen or permanent resident, and you've lived in New Zealand continuously for 12 months or more at some time in your life.

You can enrol to vote by visiting vote.nz or by calling the 24-hour freephone number 0800 36 76 56 or texting your name and address to 3676 to have an enrolment form sent via mail.

Tasman District is a vast geographical area covering 9,786 square kilometres. It is divided into five wards, Golden Bay, Lakes-Murchison, Motueka, Moutere-Waimea and Richmond. There are also two Community Boards in Golden Bay and Motueka.

Over the next few months, we'll explain the local electoral process in more detail and speak to former councillors and mayors who have left their mark in some way on Tasman.

People have many varied reasons for wanting to stand for council or mayor, but most have a powerful desire to represent and serve their community and leave a positive legacy for future Tasman residents.

Now is the time to think about enrolling or putting your hand up as a local body candidate.

- 12 August 2022: Candidate nominations close and roll closes
- 16–21 September 2022: Voting documents delivered
- 16 September 8 October 2022: Progressive roll scrutiny, special voting period, early processing

 Day voting closes midday
- October/November 2022: Elected members' swearing in ceremonies
