

## Salisbury Road water main and pedestrian crossings upgrade now complete

The road cones are gone from Salisbury Road and Richmond now has a new and improved water supply pipeline, plus two new safer pedestrian crossings.

The upgrade and installation of the new water main on Salisbury Road that started earlier this year was completed on time and under budget by the end of July.

The old pipe was fragile and unreliable so to minimise the risk of breakages and water supply disruptions it was replaced.

We also took the opportunity to improve pedestrian safety by installing

two new raised pedestrian crossings which were designed in conjunction with input from the adjacent schools.

That was where Mother Nature stepped in and created headaches for the construction teams when we were presented with one of the wettest months on record.

Not only did the bad weather delay the pouring of concrete for the crossings, but staff had to be pulled

off the job to aid with the flood cleanup across the region.

But the good news is the new pedestrian crossings were fully operational for the beginning of the fourth school term.

We'd like to thank you for your patience and understanding while we carried out this major infrastructure upgrade.

# Five new and eight returning Councillors in Tasman

The votes are in and there are five new faces around the council table following the declaration of the final results of the 2022 Tasman District Council triennial elections.

Newcomers Jo Ellis, Glen Daikee, Dan Shallcrass, Mike Kininmonth and Brent Maru will join returning Councillors Chris Hill, Celia Butler, Stuart Bryant, Christeen Mackenzie, Trindi Walker, Barry Dowler, Kit Maling and Mark Greening in the Council Chambers, led by returning Mayor Tim King.

Returning Motueka Community Board member David Armstrong along with Nick Hughes, Claire Hutt and Terina Graham have been elected to the Motueka Community Board.

Brent Maru also stood for the Motueka Community Board and was the highest polling candidate but the Local Electoral Act provides that if a person is declared to be elected as a member of the council, and that person is also declared to be elected as a member of a community board, they must be treated as having vacated office as a member of the community board.



There was no election for the Golden Bay Community Board with candidates Abbie Langford, Grant Knowles, Robert Hewison and Henry Dixon unopposed.

Voter returns were down slightly this year compared with those of three years ago.

This election the voter return was 48.89% or 20,314 votes compared to 51.68% in 2019.



## Feedback from the Māpua Community Survey is informing planning

Thank you to the 357 people who completed the Māpua Community Survey in September. Responses covered a range of views, and we were pleased to hear from people of different ages and household sizes.

The survey aimed to better understand perspectives in the community around how Māpua should grow and what aspects of the 2010 Structure Plan are relevant to the area today. This information is helping shape the Māpua Structure Plan 2023.

From the feedback, it's clear that the community highly values the Māpua village character and identity, fostering a friendly and safe community, managing stormwater, supporting the Māpua wharf area as

a focal point, and the importance of wetlands, streams, the coastline, and bush areas. We also received useful feedback on new local facilities that people would like to see.

More than half of respondents prefer new housing to be concentrated in existing residential zoned and established land areas, with a mix of housing sizes. Over 40% of respondents want retirement housing options, and 55% want smaller units or apartments. People favour building heights of one and two storeys.

There is more work to be done before we draft possible options for the refreshed Structure Plan. We were planning to engage on draft options in November.



However, for these workshops to be meaningful, we want to gather more information and give everyone more time with the technical information available on our website. We now plan to host community workshops on the structure plan refresh in late summer.

The Māpua Structure Plan 2023 will be an important document that will guide the future of Māpua – while we are keen to have this in place, we know that by taking this extra time we will create a plan that better guides development in line with community aspirations.

# IAF announcement provides \$1.2 million towards affordable and papakāinga housing in Motueka

Motueka has been included in the second tranche of projects to benefit from the Government's Infrastructure Acceleration Fund (IAF).

A new wastewater main, stormwater upgrades and a new roundabout will be supported by funding of \$1.2 million to enable a housing development on Māori-owned land.

It is expected this funding will accelerate the delivery of around 200 new homes in Motueka, which could include affordable, public and papakāinga housing.

A green belt with a wetland and native vegetation are among the proposed plans for the Motueka West development.

Chief Executive Leonie Rae says the funding announcement would not only boost housing opportunities in a growing part of the District but also assist with infrastructure within Motueka.

"We are mindful that sufficient yet appropriate development outcomes that meet the needs of our community will be vital in the years ahead. Thanks to the combined effort of Tasman District Council,

Kāinga Ora and Wakatū Incorporation, we are able to plan with more certainty to ensure these outcomes are achieved."

Wakatū Incorporation CEO Kerensa Johnston says, "This is a critical project for Wakatū, focused on our community, and creating a vibrant and diverse place to live in the Tasman region – we are really pleased to see it progress."

## Safety improvements for Motueka intersection


Following community concerns that were raised with us about the safety of one of Motueka's intersections, we've made changes to its layout.

People were worried about the intersection of Old Wharf Road and Trewavas Street where vehicles often ignored the give way sign and drove straight through.

We reviewed the situation and have changed the priority traffic layout.

The intersection has been reconfigured to a standard T-intersection, with a new stop sign and road marking installed on Trewavas Street.

The give way control on Old Wharf Road has been removed so drivers on Old Wharf Road heading west from Motueka Quay now have priority over drivers turning out of Trewavas Street.



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# Motueka's new water treatment plant is flowing

After a few teething problems, Motueka's brand new \$3.5 million water treatment plant is now online and undergoing full testing.

Those properties connected to our supply will be receiving some of the best quality drinking water available.

The plant was due to be commissioned a few months ago but a couple of pipework problems were found and needed to be fixed before we could turn the tap on.

The new plant uses multiple water treatment barriers and follows the NZ Drinking Water Standards and Water Services Act requirements for the treatment/removal of protozoa and bacteria. It includes UV treatment, cartridge filtration, and residual chlorine disinfection.

New Zealand's drinking water laws have changed and under the

Water Services Act 2021, all councils must provide residual disinfection, chlorine, for all but the smallest public drinking water supplies by 15 November 2022.

The treated drinking water is perfectly safe for human consumption, however if you have fish in outdoor ponds, you should turn down incoming water to an absolute trickle which dilutes any chlorine levels to a safe amount for fish.

For fish tanks inside, fill a container of water and let it sit for at least 24 hours, then replace the water one-third at a time. If you are still concerned, you can buy water treatment products at pet shops.



Some houses may notice a slight change in the taste of their water for a short period of time, however this will become less noticeable as more water is pumped through the pipe network over the next couple of weeks.

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## Warmer months herald closer watch on water use

The 2022/2023 summer season starts on 31 October and with that comes the need to keep an eye on how much water we use during the warmer months.



We are currently updating our data which relates to the state of our aquifers, river flows and groundwater levels. This is of particular interest to Waimea water users due to the susceptibility of this area to water restrictions.

The results are expected to be presented in mid to late November and will provide a useful basis for the Dry Weather Task Force in making water rationing or restriction decisions this summer.

For consent holders in the Waimea Affiliated and Unaffiliated water management zones, it's important to note that the Waimea Dam will not be operational at the start of this summer season. Therefore, water volumes and rationing levels will be as per your resource consent pre-dam authorised limits.

For the rest of us, any rationing for the Tasman District over this summer season which is not already subject to individual resource consent rationing triggers will be applied using Section 329 of the Resource Management Act 1991 in consultation with the Dry Weather Task Force.

While we have had some significant rainfall over the winter months – it can only take a few weeks of dry or windy weather and increasing water use to result in aquifer levels and river flows dropping quickly. This will then require water restrictions or rationing to be implemented.

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# Relief offered to Tasman's Great Taste Trail users



Tasman's Great Taste Trail users will be relieved to know that the construction of a new public toilet has been completed on the route between Richmond and Moturoa / Rabbit Island.

The new facilities which cost around \$55,000 to build, have just opened on a side track slightly off the official trail route at the top of Estuary Place.

Meanwhile, the construction of a brand-new toilet block at Easby Park on Marlborough Crescent in Richmond is coming to completion and is expected to be open for use within the next couple of weeks.

# A record number of pictures promote peace

Record entry numbers have led to nine works by budding Tasman artists being sent to Japan for this year's *Mayors for Peace* art competition.

Mayor Tim King selected the top entries from a record 77 works submitted by students across the region. The *Mayors for Peace* initiative was set up in 1982 by the then-Mayor of Hiroshima and membership has since grown to 8,047 cities in 165 countries, including the Tasman District.

As a member of the global group, Tasman Mayor Tim King invited

all schools in the region to help promote peace by entering the global art competition which aims to provide opportunities for young people to think about the importance of peace and to foster their peace-seeking spirit.

The nine young Tasman artists drew their motivation and inspiration for promoting peace from a variety of sources, from enjoying the great outdoors to bringing people together in a world without war and conflict, through to promoting acceptance of all people.

The nine finalists are Lucy Gauntlett, Aria Robertson, Gracie Quinney, Eliza Rynvos, Eva Hazel Carter, Griffin Barak,



Nia Golsner, Rhys Barak and Blaire Brown, all of whom were presented with certificates and vouchers at a ceremony earlier this month.

International competition results will be announced early next year in Japan with the winning artwork being printed on stationery which *Mayors for Peace* will use to promote awareness of the importance of peace education.



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## More artwork is coming to a cabinet near you

Five Chorus communication cabinets, three in Richmond, one in Motueka and one in Wakefield, have been chosen for beautification, and we have now selected the artists for each cabinet.

These cabinets become works of street art, often telling stories about the communities in which they are found – the art also discourages tagging.

Melissa Linton will use the cabinet in Greenwood Street in Motueka as her canvas to create *Ngā wāhine o Motueka* standing for the strong Wāhine Māori in Motueka who, at the moment, are rising and succeeding in all areas of life.

A cabinet on Hill Street in Richmond will feature *He moana pukepuke e ekengia e te waka* by Nerys Ngaruhe as an accolade to those on their cultural reclamation journey and the art of graffiti.

Another cabinet at the other end of Hill Street is sure to get some smiles with Stella Wilson's reimagining of a giant Marmite jar called *Sunny-tarium Richmond*.

*Oceans Away* on a cabinet in Wakefield will be a work by Saraya Pomana representing the space between loved ones during the isolating events we have faced in recent times.

Pauline Neal's abstract work *Connecting* is going to feature on Croucher Street in Richmond and is a depiction of the connection of fibres created for communication and the ever-advancing medium of technology.

# A glimpse of the past using tomorrow's technology

A local project that will see the very latest in artificial intelligence technology used to open a door on the past, is just one of the successful applicants to our latest round of Community Grants funding.



Every year we set aside some money from rates to help groups and organisations across Tasman with funding.

This year we've managed to aid 131 community groups and organisations throughout Tasman with more than \$200,000 in grants which were announced recently.

One of those projects is the development of a living heritage trail Museum along Tasman's Great Taste Trail, using augmented reality immersive experiences at locations of historical interest.

But what does that mean?

Project Lead Sarah Arnold says basically people will use an app on their smartphone and point their camera at a certain object or place

and will experience an animation, video or photographs of the landscape they are in.

She says the Waimea South area is rich in history and untold stories which can be brought to life in a virtual world.

Sarah says the points of significance will be flagged by special marker posts, made from recycled plastics, installed along the trail, hence the project's name *Post Memory*.

She is working with a Malaysian technology company and NMIT students from the Bachelor of Computer-Generated Imagery to develop the project.

Sarah says the \$3,500 Council grant is being used to create a proof of concept, focusing on the William

Higgins gallery cobb cottage at Spring Grove.

Meanwhile, a breakdown of the rest of the Community Grants allocations shows community and economic development initiatives were given \$30,000, as were arts, culture, heritage and historical organisations.

Various festivals and events were awarded \$35,000 with youth and children's groups sharing \$25,000.

Various social services received \$30,000 while environmental initiatives successfully applied for shares of \$20,000.

Several Tasman-based community emergency services shared \$16,000 with \$33,000 injected into a variety of sports and recreation facilities.

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# Summer's nearly here – so it's time to sort your winter firewood!

It's time to think about buying your firewood for next winter and this year we can help cover some of the cost with our 'Good Wood' discount promotion.

We have joined Nelson City Council and will provide a \$25 discount off the price of firewood per household.

The promotion runs until Friday 23 December 2022, or until fully distributed, whichever comes first.

The smallest load of wood size is 3 cubic metres to qualify for a discount.

Our chosen Good Wood suppliers are committed to supplying dry, seasoned firewood, suitable for immediate use, so that's wood that has a moisture content of less than 25% dry weight. This wood can be stored away immediately.

Or you can go green. Green, unseasoned firewood is delivered sufficiently far in advance of winter so that when properly stored by the user, it will be seasoned for use the following winter. You will need to allow this wood to dry before storing it away.

When discussing your firewood requirements with your Good Wood supplier, make it clear whether you are happy to receive green wood to dry over summer, or if you are planning to store it away immediately that you need dry wood.

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## Consultation on proposals relating to Best Island Recreation Reserve

A number of landowners on Best Island currently only have legal access to their property via the sea and/or foot access via Esplanade Reserve. The physical road formation that people use for vehicle access has never formally been legalised. The existing informal road runs through the middle of the reserve.

We are proposing to realign the road on Best Island to run along the inside of the reserve's northern and western boundaries and to declare these areas as legal road.

Following requirements under the Reserves Act 1977, Tasman District Council is seeking submissions on a proposal to:

- revoke part (175 square metres) of Best Island Recreation Reserve to sell to the adjoining landowner in accordance with Section 24 of the Reserves Act 1977; and

- classify the remaining area (2,415 square metres) as Recreation Reserve in accordance with Section 16 of the Reserves Act 1977.

In addition, to formalise the creation of the legal road, we propose writing to the Minister of Conservation requesting that part of the land (780 square metres) be declared as required for public works under section 52 of the Public Works Act, to assist in the creation of a legal road. Submissions may

also be provided on our decision to write to the Minister.
