Local artists top Peaceful Towns art competition

Two young Tasman artists have taken out top placings in the international Mayors for Peace children's art competition "Peaceful Towns" 2022.

More than 4,300 artworks were whittled down to 239 finalists, and Tasman's Lucy Gauntlett and Aria Robertson won second and third place respectively in the six to 10-year-old category.

The competition, run by the office of the Mayor of Hiroshima in Japan, began in 1982 and this year attracted entries from 66 cities across 14 countries.

Lucy Gauntlett from Ranzau School drew inspiration while reading under a tree in a park where she saw two friends walking a dog and could hear peaceful music.

Lucy says there was also a peaceful fishpond, and she could see someone practicing yoga.

"It was a peaceful park setting and I felt happy in the fresh air."

Aria Robertson from Brightwater's artwork shares a vision for more acceptance, love and peace for all people in all communities around the world.

Lucy and Aria's pictures were selected by Mayor Tim King and were included in the nine top entries from a record 77 works submitted by students from across Tasman District, that were sent to Japan for the competition.

Councillor Christeen Mackenzie, Moutere-Waimea Ward

Many of our residents participate in voluntary work to enhance our biodiversity on both private and public land and I would like to see the Council continuing to provide support to these volunteers over the coming 12 months.

Share your ideas for special projects in Motueka

Do you have any ideas for small projects in the Motueka Ward (including Riwaka and the northern beaches) that would improve facilities for the community?

The Motueka Community Board has a budget of \$55,000 to spend each year on such projects, each of which can cost up to about \$10,000. The Board starts with a list of new ideas, and you, the community, are encouraged to contribute.

Past projects have included playground equipment, park benches and seating, signage and plaques, and short stretches of inadequate or new footpaths.

Those that fall within the \$10,000 budget and which provide community-wide benefits are then voted on, online and in the Motueka Guardian, in March/April.

Those with the highest vote and in total add up to the \$55,000 budget, become Community Board projects for the next financial year starting July 1, 2023.

Have a wheelie good time on the Family Bike Ride

Come along and join us for this fun family bike ride with a twist – setting off from Richmond on Saturday 25 February from 10.00 am. It's open to everyone and is about celebrating and enjoying cycling.

We will start at the entrance to the Richmond Aquatic Centre car park and finish at Moturoa/Rabbit Island.

On your way, look out for fun activities – it's not about rushing to the end but enjoying the experience along the way.

Before you get going, you will be able to check your bike with our bike mechanic while getting some safety tips from our cycling educators.

There will also be games and a sausage sizzle waiting for you at the end of the ride.

The route is on flat ground along Tasman's Great Taste Trail; however it's a long trip, approximately 20 km, and it could take you between 1.5 to 3 hours (one way).

Harvest temporarily disrupts Kingsland access

Some important work is about to begin in the hills above Richmond as we prepare for Kingsland Forest's new lease of life.

Our forestry management partner PF Olsen has scheduled a harvest for a section of pinus radiata in the vicinity of Lodestone Gully from mid-March, lasting about three months.

This will be one of the last commercial harvests in the reserve as we move towards creating a recreational and biodiversity asset for Richmond. During the harvest period, a blanket closure is likely for trails in and around the harvest area, particularly around Lodestone Gully and Reservoir Creek.

The 'Big Skid' is a focal point of the entire operation and will also be closed for the duration as well as all tracks in and out of this location.

Fencing and advanced warning signage will be installed soon and will remain in place throughout the harvest.

As well as the initial plans for the area, Government Better Off Funding

of \$555,000 has allowed us to further increase facilities and plant more natives in place of the pines that are being harvested.

More information will be available closer to the time as closures and operations are finalised.

There are many alternative recreational areas nearby, and we encourage people to make the most of these.

Creating a safe, sustainable corridor on Māpua's Aranui Road

Māpua is the ideal location to make the most of outdoor pursuits by foot or bike.

Last year, Waka Kotahi granted us \$840,000 to improve walking and cycling along Aranui Road, as part of the nationwide 'Streets for People' programme.

To make sure that we create a safe, sustainable road corridor, where attractive and inviting streets offer something for everyone, we're keen to get our community involved.

Last November, we posted a request on Facebook inviting any interested members of the Māpua community to join our Streets for People working group.

The goal of the working group is to help produce an initial concept plan

for Aranui Road upgrades, which will then be shared with the wider community for feedback. In parallel, Māpua school has also been involved in some early feedback on how they'd like to see things shape up.

Recently, Māpua residents may have noticed posters going up around the village, inviting people to do our safety survey. We will use this to establish baseline data for the project on how people currently feel about using Aranui Road.

Once we've completed the project, a similar survey will be released. This will give us a 'before and after' view from the community, to gauge the success of the improvement project.



We have a number of opportunities coming up for businesses and the wider community to join us, learn more and refine the project throughout 2023.

Share with care

Summer is a magical time to get out on the network of cycleways and walkways that crisscross Tasman, but many of these are shared paths so extra care is needed at times.

These shared paths are for all users, many with different kinds of mobility. There are walkers, bike riders, people with pushchairs, children on scooters, and more.

Our Road Safety Co-ordinator Jeni Thornborough says cyclists are often the fastest on these paths so it's important they look out for others when riding, and slow down when approaching others.

"Ring your bell and pass with care."

She says there are a few other simple things for riders to consider as well like riding in a visible position on



a path, maybe wearing brightly coloured clothing, and if you are riding at night add in lights and reflective material.

Jeni's advice to riders is to stay alert and continually scan the environment to be aware of what's happening around you.

She says pedestrians may cross the path without looking properly first if they don't hear bikes approaching.

... And speaking of hearing, Jeni says everyone using shared paths should listen to their surroundings, using headphones will restrict your ability to hear possible hazards.

"With a little consideration and understanding from all users, we can all get out and about and enjoy the rest of summer without incident."

Money available for waste projects

If you have an idea for minimising waste in Tasman, we may have some money available to help.

We have waste minimisation grants available to support innovative projects, but time is running out to apply, the deadline is 17 March.

As well as reducing waste, these grants are intended to support community engagement and education and to get people to:

- Rethink how we use and value our resources to avoid the creation of waste.
- Reduce the amount of waste we create

- · Reuse resources.
- · Recycle or recover materials.

The grants are also intended to support our Tasman communities to show kaitiakitanga (guardianship) of our natural resources.

This money is intended to support larger-scale projects, with typical funding of \$5000 or greater per application and will generally be given as one-off grants to help a group or organisation create an enduring and self-sustaining waste minimisation initiative.

Funding can be used for things like project set-up and/or running costs,



capital costs like the purchase of tools or equipment, operating costs, including wages, and monitoring and evaluation of the volume of waste diverted from landfill.

Notice of intention to grant lease

Under Section 54 (1) (b) of the Reserves Act 1977, the Tasman District Council is publicly notifying an intention to grant a lease to the Mohua MenzShed Incorporated for a term of 30 years over approximately 286 square metres for the purpose of constructing a Menzshed Workshop. The land is part of the Golden **Bay Showgrounds Recreation Reserve** (commonly known as the Golden Bay Recreation Park) described as Part Section 1 of Section 22 Tākaka Block X Waitapu Survey District and contained in Certificate of Title NL62/224.
