FOUND

The Found AGM is to be held on 4 April. It will be recommended at this meeting that Found Incorporated will wind up at the end of June 2006 and that Tasman District Council and Nelson City Council manage the Found Community Database and contract with Volunteer Nelson with a reference group from the community to meet six monthly. The two Councils do have an existing budget to support the Found Directory.

SPARC RURAL TRAVEL FUND

Background

The Rural Travel Fund was developed in response to concerns raised by Tasman District Council and other territorial authorities about the barriers for participation in sport by young people living in rural communities. It has been agreed by SPARC that the Rural Travel fund will be available in 2005/2006 and is targeted at young people aged between 5 and 19 years.

This is an interim measure until a rural participation strategy is fully developed and implemented.

The rural travel fund is designed to help subsidise travel for junior teams participating in local sport competition. The allocation of the funds is based on a population density formula for territorial authorities whom have less than 10 people per square kilometre. Tasman is allocated a total of \$11,027.34 available to allocate for the 2005/2006 financial year, the next round closing 28 April.

Rural Travel Fund Eligibilities

Application for the rural travel fund is open to rural sports clubs and rural school teams with young people aged between 5 and 19 years who require subsidies to assist with transport expenses to local sporting competitions.

There will be two funding rounds, the first closing on 31 October 2005 and the second closing on 28 April 2006.

The Rural Travel Fund is to be managed by the Tasman District Council on behalf of SPARC. Funding is not be provided for the purpose of travel to regional or national events.

BOREDOM BUSTERS MAGAZINE

In response to requests from programme providers and parents, the Boredom Busters magazine is being extended to a regional magazine on a similar model to Mudcakes and Roses. The magazine will continue to be coordinated by the Tasman District Council Community Recreation staff and published and designed by Dry Crust but will include information on both Tasman and Nelson Holiday programmes. Nelson City Council will coordinate gathering information on Nelson based programmes and will contribute to the publication and printing costs on a cost share basis. The publication will become the one publication with information on recreation opportunities for 5–14 years olds avoiding creating duplicate publications for Nelson and Tasman.

UPDATE ON PROGRESS TOWARDS THE ARTISTS RETREAT PROGRAMME, 10/11 JUNE 2006 AT ST ARNAUD

An overview of the responses received from the February community meetings on what should be included in the retreat is as follows.

People from all artform groups confirmed that networking is one of the main things that interest them about the retreat. Interest was also in an opportunity to learn new skills especially in the area of marketing and incorporating a show and tell opportunity to share work with other artists. Other workshop topics suggested were tax/bookkeeping, how to contact suppliers, pricing and copyright.

A debate was proposed to be included in the programme to discuss the topic of how to balance artistic and commercial imperatives when working as an artist.

NELSON TASMAN PHYSICAL ACTIVTY PLAN

BIKE WISE WEEK

On Sunday 26 March over 600 riders took to their bikes and followed Mayors of Nelson and Tasman out through the newly opened Salisbury Road underpass to mark the beginning of Bike Wise week. The family fun ride was part of a national event where Mayors from around the country brought out their bikes and took part in the first Mayoral Cycle Challenge. Mayor Hurley rode a quad bike with a fellow Councillor Eileen Wilkins and other celebrities. Two bikes were given away on the day and in both cases the winners had borrowed bikes so that they could participate in the ride.

GO BY BIKE DAY

Community breakfasts were held on Wednesday 1 March in Takaka and Motueka with 70 and 90 riders stopping.

TDC staff entered the national competition with the Richmond Staff riding 5358 kms during the week.
