#### 1. REASON FOR REPORT

The Dog Control Act requires territorial authorities to publicly report annually on dog control policy and practices as outlined under Section 10a of the Dog Control Act 1996. This report contains information and statistics on Council's dog control activity for the year 1 July 2009 to 30 June 2010.

## 2. DOG CONTROL AND ENFORCEMENT PRACTICES IN TASMAN DISTRICT COUNCIL

Control Services (Nelson) Ltd carries out Council's dog control activities, providing 24 hour, seven day per week coverage for the Tasman District. Three full time dog control officers are employed by Control Services to implement Council's policy and practices throughout the Tasman District. Nine on-call staff attend to the emergencies and/or after hours activities in the outlying areas of Murchison (three), Golden Bay (two), Motueka (two) and the Tapawera and Wakefield districts (two).

Council staff and Control Services work closely with local veterinarians, the three SPCA branches in the district and Department of Conservation staff. Good relations are also fostered between Dog Control and the Police and Dog Obedience Clubs.

Dog Control Officers provide regular educational visits to local schools as well as community organisations and businesses, reinforcing the message of ensuring safety around dogs in the home and in the wider community.

### 2.1 Website and Media

Increasingly, Council's website is being utilised by the public as a first point of contact for information on dog control, safety around dogs and for dog registration information. The content of the web pages relating to Animal Control is reviewed and updated regularly enabling Council to provide the latest information on legislative changes and items of interest to dog owners. Feedback from dog owners indicates

that they appreciate the pro-active approach Council takes towards providing them with informative articles on dog care and safety, as well as the essential information on the registration and enforcement processes.

Council continues to use its fortnightly newsletter as a tool for informing both dog owners and the community of any issues relating to dog control. These articles serve to remind dog owners of their responsibilities as well as providing educational items on the care and control of dogs. Such publicity fulfils the obligation imposed on Council by the Dog Control Act 1996 to inform and educate owners and the community in general.

## 5. DOGS PROHIBITED, LEASH ONLY AND DOG EXERCISE AREAS

Council's Policy on Dogs and the Bylaw were reviewed in 2009, during the reporting period. Minor changes were made to the exercise areas designated in the previous Policy and Bylaw to more clearly define those areas concerned. The Dog Control Bylaw 2009 sets out the areas in the District which are "Dog Prohibited", "Leash only" and "Controlled Dog Exercise Areas". The wording in the Policy on Dogs has also been simplified. The Dog Control Bylaw 2009 became operative in September 2009.

Council continues to work in co-operation with Department of Conservation to monitor areas where protected wildlife could be at risk. A limited number of Department of Conservation Rangers are warranted under the Dog Control Act 1996 as they work in the remote areas where stray dogs occasionally appear.

#### 6. DOG REGISTRATION AND OTHER FEES

The registration fees for dogs are set each year as part of the Council's Annual Plan Process. In 2009/2010 the registration fees were \$44.00 for Urban Dogs and \$27.00 for Rural Dogs which included the fees to cover the National Dog Database costs. Tasman District Council continues to provide one of the most cost effective and simply administered fee structures in the country for its dog owners.

# 7. FURTHER COMMENTS ON REVIEW OF THE POLICY ON DOGS AND DOG BYLAW

Council is aware of its twofold responsibility under the Dog Control Act 1996 to provide areas where dogs may be exercised, as well as striving to minimise the potential danger, distress and nuisance uncontrolled dogs may cause to the community generally.

During last year's review of its Policy and Bylaw, Council set out to better achieve these objectives through using simpler language and providing maps so that both dog owners and the general public know whether an area has a particular designation in relation to dogs.

Council has been replacing and renewing signs in areas where dogs may or may not be allowed and will continue to do so over the next few years.

#### 8. PROPERTY VISITS

Council has adopted a targeted approach in carrying out property visits in order to allow more time to follow up on unregistered dogs and owners who fail to meet their obligations. Specific areas of concern will continue to drive this approach such as historically noted places where there is potential for unregistered dogs to be housed without directly coming to Dog Control Officers' attention.

#### 9. **RECOMMENDATIONS**

- 1. That Report REP10-08-05 required pursuant to Section 10A of the Dog Control Act 1996, be received and adopted by Council.
- That the adopted report REP10-08-05 be publicly notified and be made available on the Council's website with a copy being sent to the Secretary for Local Government.
