Gail Williamson	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • The public have a right to pass along road reserve • Fencing and other improvements are to be removed on termination • By resolution of the Community Services Committee on 7 September 2004 the termination date for bach on the esplanade reserve was reset to be the same as the baches on road reserve • Council should commit to the preparation of a development plan for the soon to be released area so that it can be reformed for recreational use • Development of additional shaded picnic areas, tables and barbeques • Pathway through area and out onto peninsula would be a pleasant addition
