

Engagement round one (2020) COMPLETE Hearing from our communities, confirming the issues (to direct policy & planning work), intro TEP, building participants database.



Engagement round two (2021/22) Developing/testing issues and options with communities and stakeholders through targeted engagement.



Engagement round three (2023) Consultation on the draft Tasman Environment Plan.



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### **Principles of engagement**

1) Engagement will seek out and facilitate the involvement of those potentially affected by and/or interested in a decision.

2) We will only engage where the public's contribution will influence decision-making and communicate limitations clearly.

3) We will seek diversity in our participants, including voices under-represented in government consultation processes.

- 4) We will seek input from potential participants in designing how they can engage with us.
- 5) We will provide participants with the information they need to engage meaningfully.
- 6) We will close the loop by communicating to participants the range of feedback received and how their input influenced planning.



### **No Place Like Home**

- We asked local young people to tell us what makes Tasman awesome, and what could make it even better.
- The entries were presented at local events and families invited to view them.
- Prizes were given to the participating classrooms at their end of year assemblies  $\bullet$ and teachers were very positive about the experience.
- This engagement worked well for the five classes that participated. Feedback from  $\bullet$ non-participating schools was they were catching up on a disrupted school year, and earlier in the year would be better.

Conversations throughout the region between asman District Council representatives and the sublic have pointed to five areas the community are particularly invested in.

850 people were spoken to and over 2000 comnents have been looked through. The key arcas raised were housing affordability, sustainable growth, transport options, biodiversity, and resh water management

s the first time in round twenty years the community has had the opportunity to have such an influence in plans. They have included asking for ideas from chil-

"Kids are pretty insightful when it comes to planning," Barry said.

While they had 21 meetings in various commusities, the issues that came up were fairly conistent, Richmond residents commented more n transport congestion, but smaller communities also raised the issue having noticed the busy oads when they come into town.

Then there is the rampant rate at which houses are going up, the difficulty to buy a house and the shortage of accommodation," said Barry

This is balanced with our region having some of the best land in the country for growing fruit and vegetables. The conundrum is how to meet ousing needs while also needing the land for

Barry said that what they are doing now consulting the public isn't compulsory, but there is more flexibility and ability to change at this stage. It's not the council plan, it's Tasman's plan," he caid.

Based on other councils throughout the country, the process takes six to ten years. The council is summitted to keeping people up-to-date

The challenge is that because it's such a long process, how do we keep people engaged," he said. "What we hear from our communities now will make a difference for how we look after our district for generations to come," said mayor Tim King.



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

The creation of the Tasman Environment Plan has attracted 2000 pieces of feedback in the first round of community engagement by Tasman District Council.

Described in a council statement as its first round of "community conversations" on the new plan, the council gathered the feedback over 10 weeks via its environmentplan.tasman.govt.nz website and 21 communitybased events

"What we have heard will make a difference to the shape of Aorere ki uta, Aorere ki tai - Tasman Environment Plan," the council says in the statement.

The new plan will replace the council's existing resource management plans, the Tasman Regional Policy Statement and the Tasman Resource


"The abuse of our river in dry times it gets far too low for instream life."

## **Preparing for Engagement Round Two**

- Currently developing our approach for testing issues and options given huge scope of topics to be covered.
- To help refine our options and ensure they are practicable, we will consult/involve community groups and stakeholders on very important or contentious issues.
- We will be clear with our communities and stakeholders about the limitations of their influence – for example there is strong national direction for some issues.
- We will also run targeted engagement when we release technical information.



## **Engaging with iwi**

- The task of developing a combined plan which is workable, will be supported by implementing respectful engagement processes with iwi, hapu and Maori.
- Relationship-building: Successful partnerships will help to facilitate collaborative resource management to the benefit of the whole district.
- Work continues with the iwi policy working group.

#### **Creating the Tasman Environment Plan**

As we prepare to create a new resource management plan for Tasman, we have been hearing from our communities about local environmental and development issues and opportunities.

Our first round of community conversations has now closed and we want to say a big thank you to the hundreds of people who live, work, and play in Tasman and have shared issues, experiences, and ideas with us. Over the past 10 weeks, we have gathered more than 2,000 pieces of feedback through 21 community-based events and our <u>plan website</u>. What we have heard will make a difference to the shape of Aorere ki uta, Aorere ki tai – Tasman Environment Plan.

Early analysis of feedback reveals recurring <u>issues and opportunities</u> around freshwater, affordable housing, sustainable growth, biodiversity, and transport options. We have also heard about the things that <u>make our places special</u>. Tasman's beaches, wetlands, community spirit, peaceful nature, and parks have featured strongly.

We will begin next year by fully processing all the issues and opportunities we've heard and continue working with councillors and iwi, before coming back to you with round two of engagement on some of our options. The options will help progress
